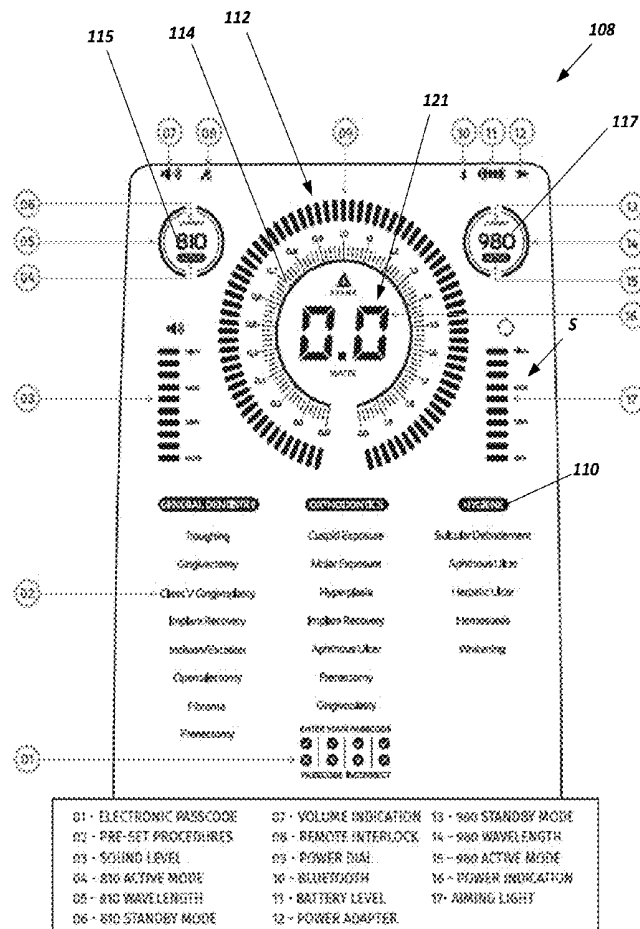

Medical apparatuses with selectively dimmable displays are disclosed herein. Some embodiments include a housing, a laser surgical handpiece device, a laser source that generates laser light that is emitted through the laser surgical handpiece device, an electroluminescent display associated with the housing, the electroluminescent display being configured to display operational settings for the laser source, the operational settings including at least power level and pulse width or duration, and a microprocessor for controlling the electroluminescent display to selectively illuminate or dim at least a portion of the operational settings displayed thereon based on the operational settings selected by a user.



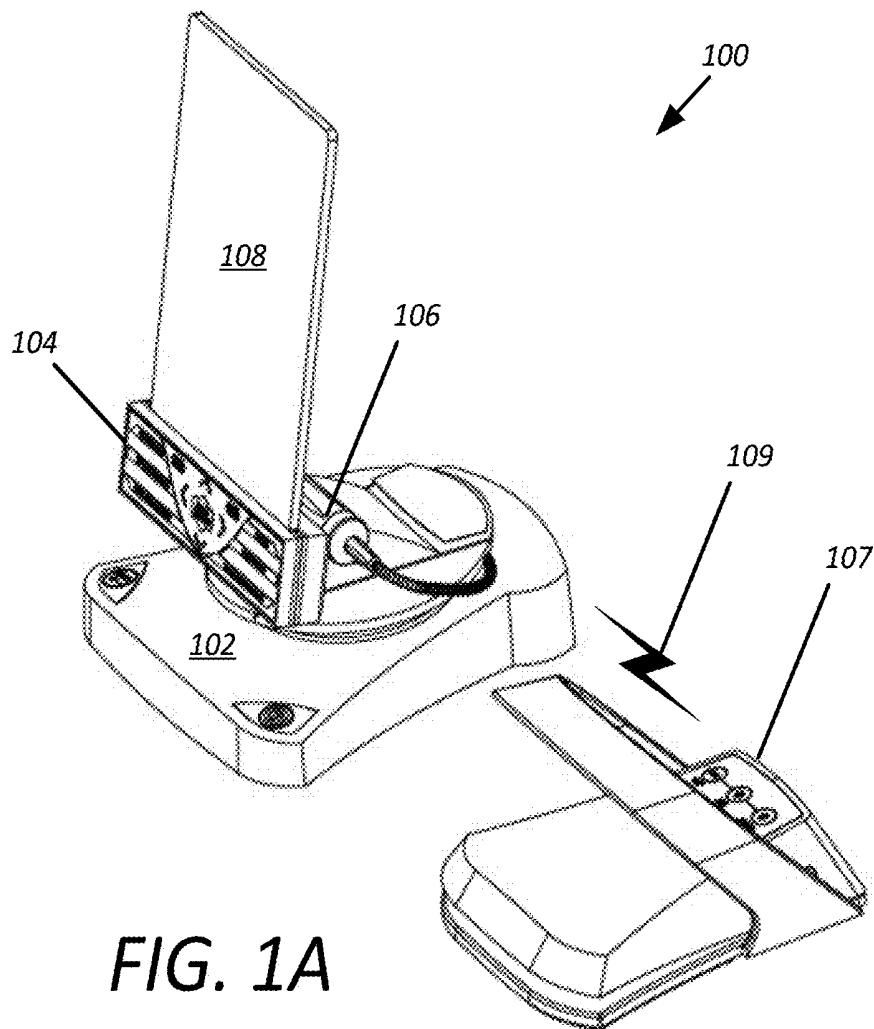

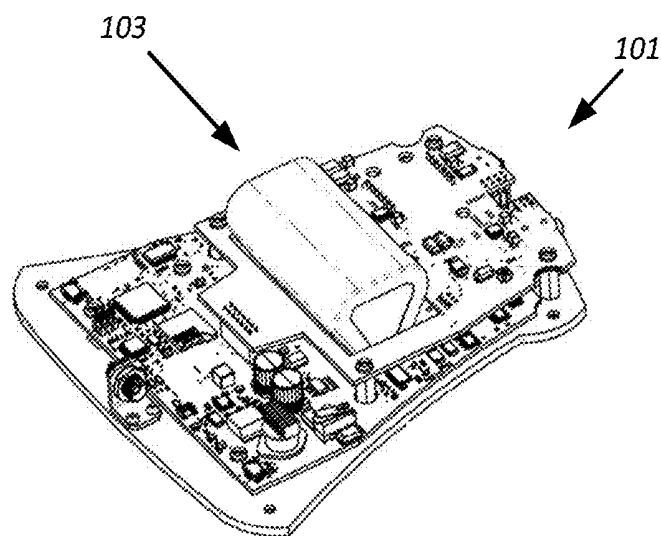

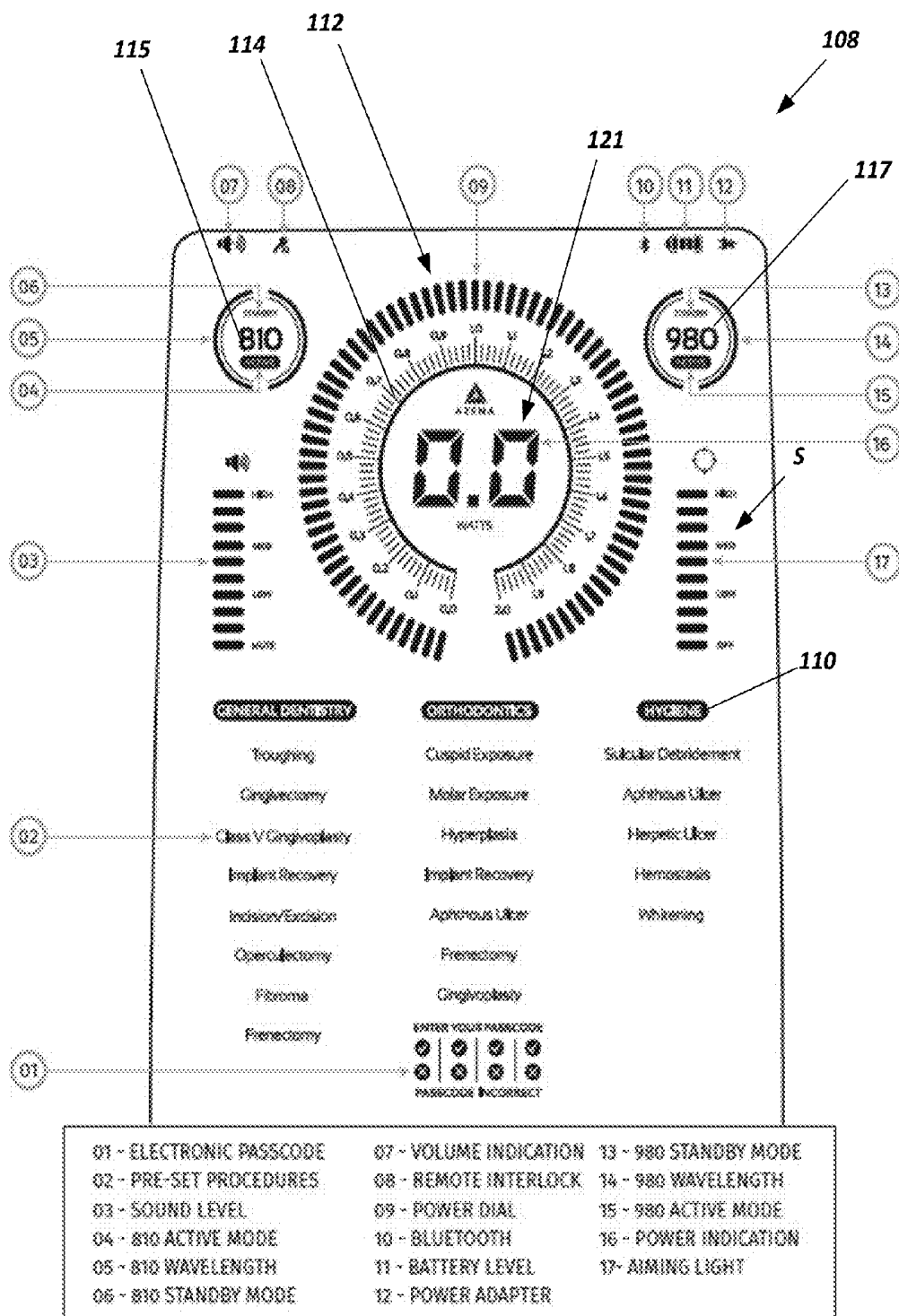

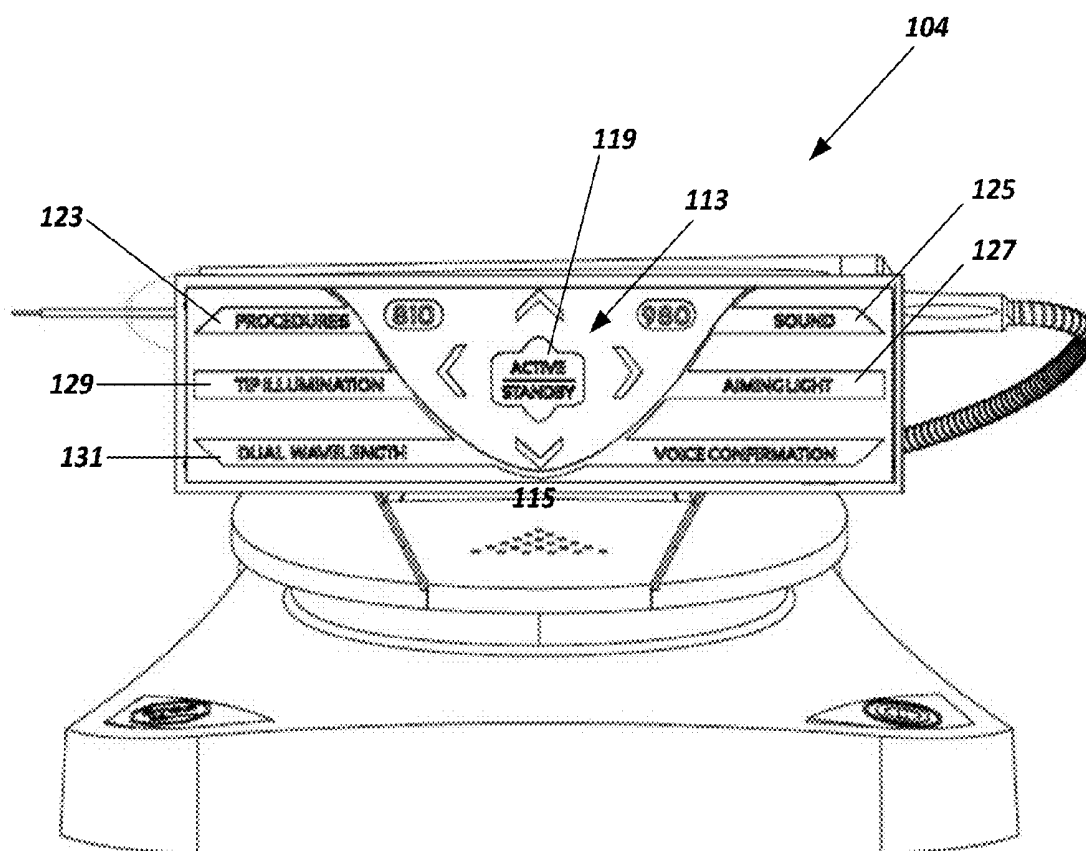

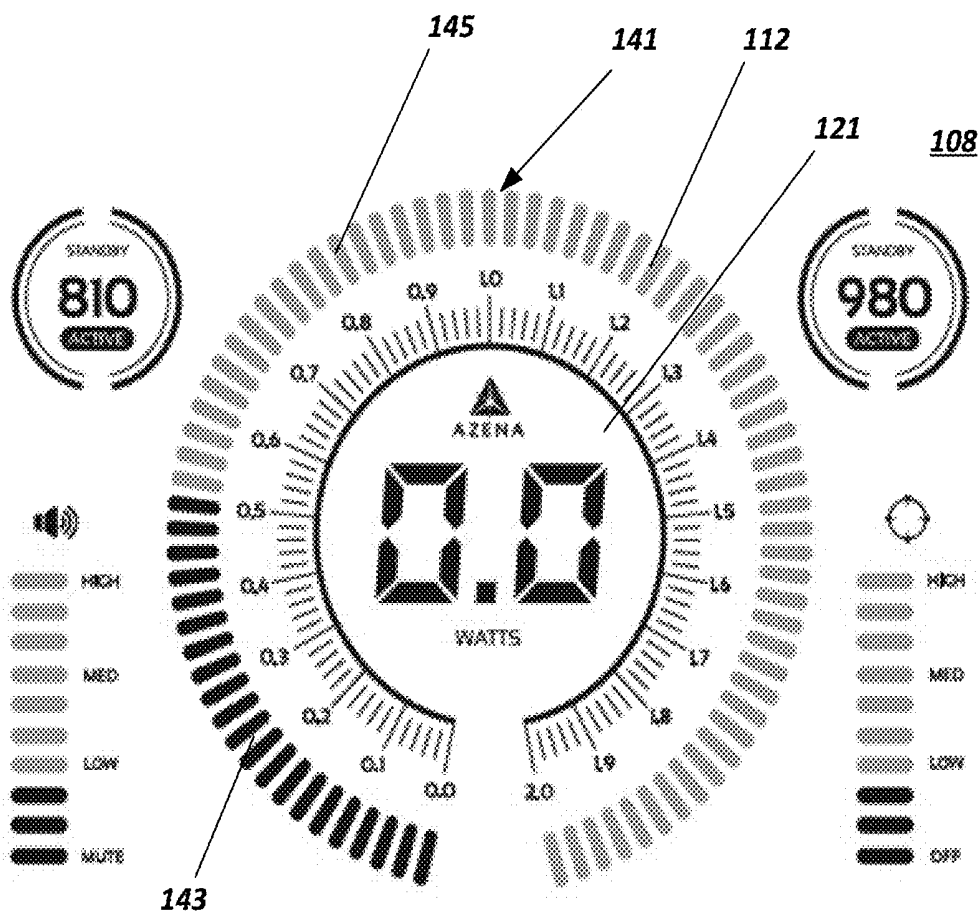

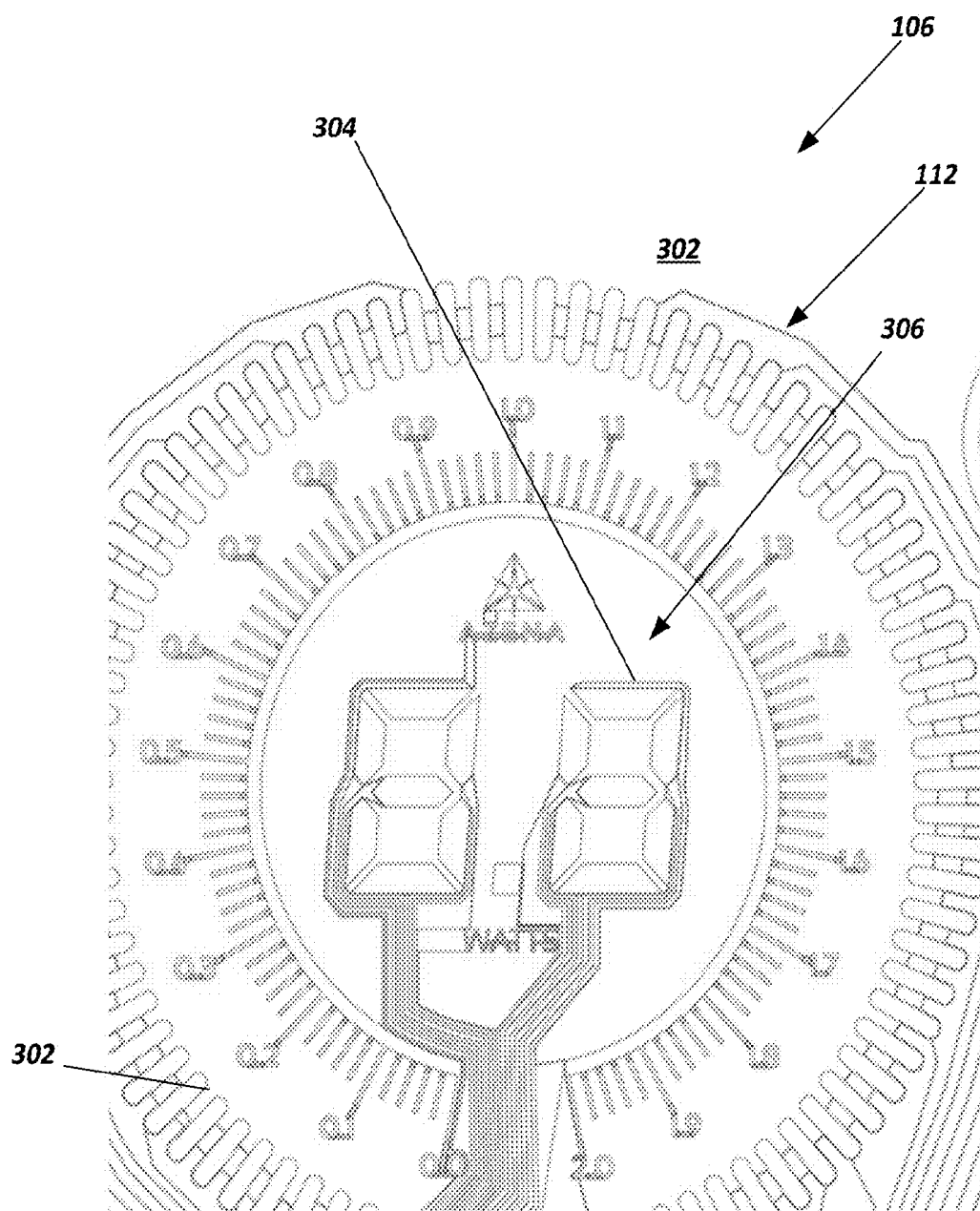

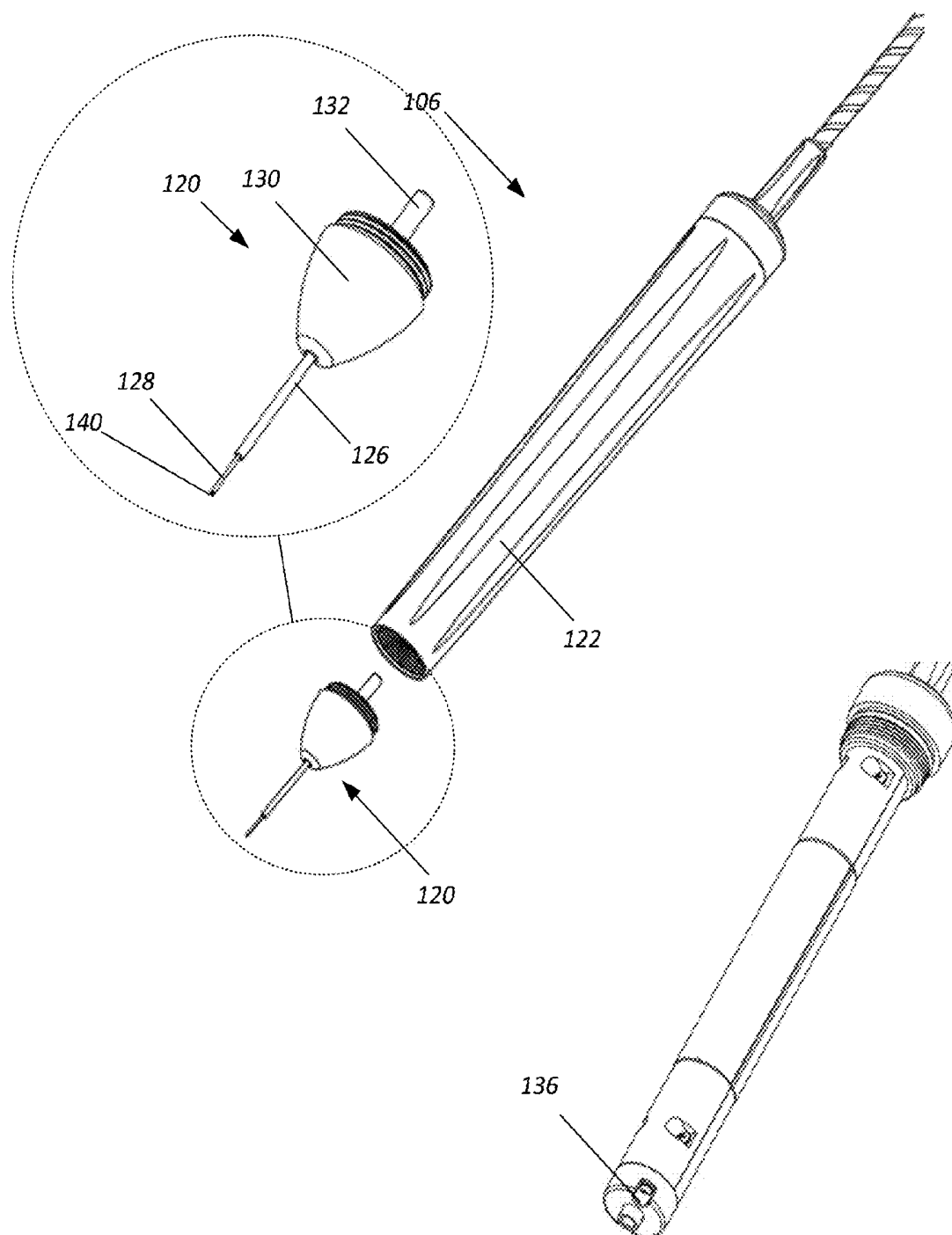

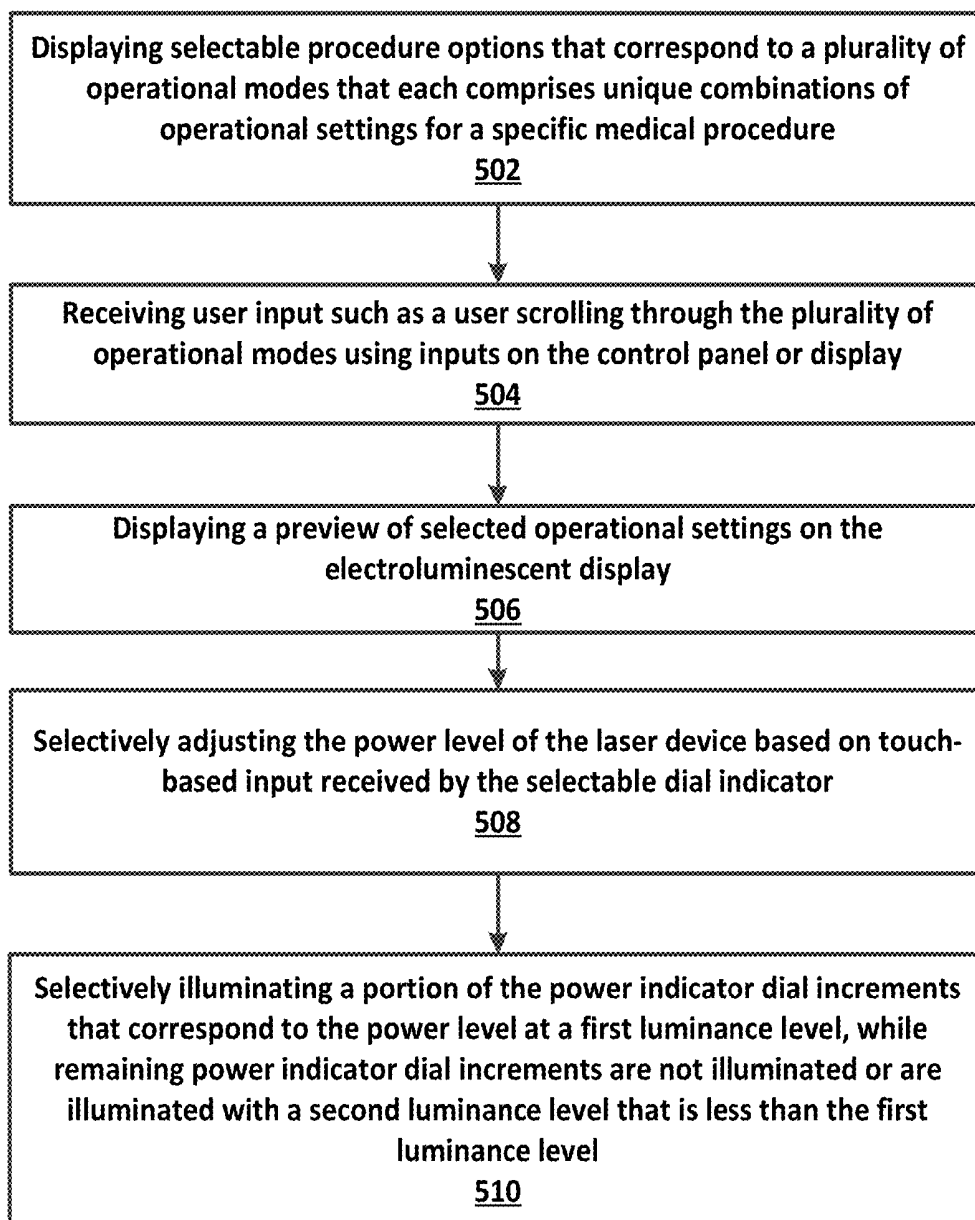

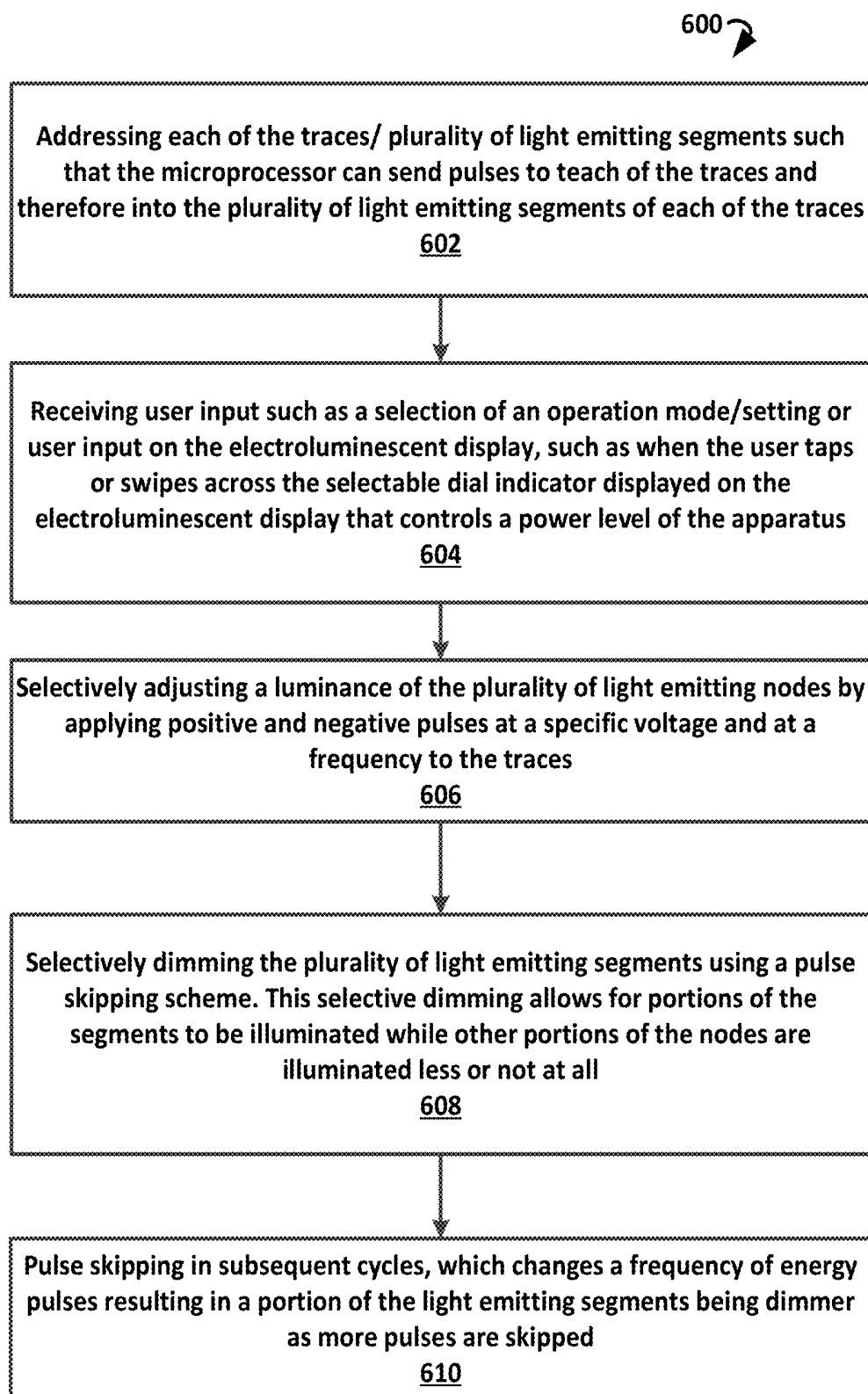

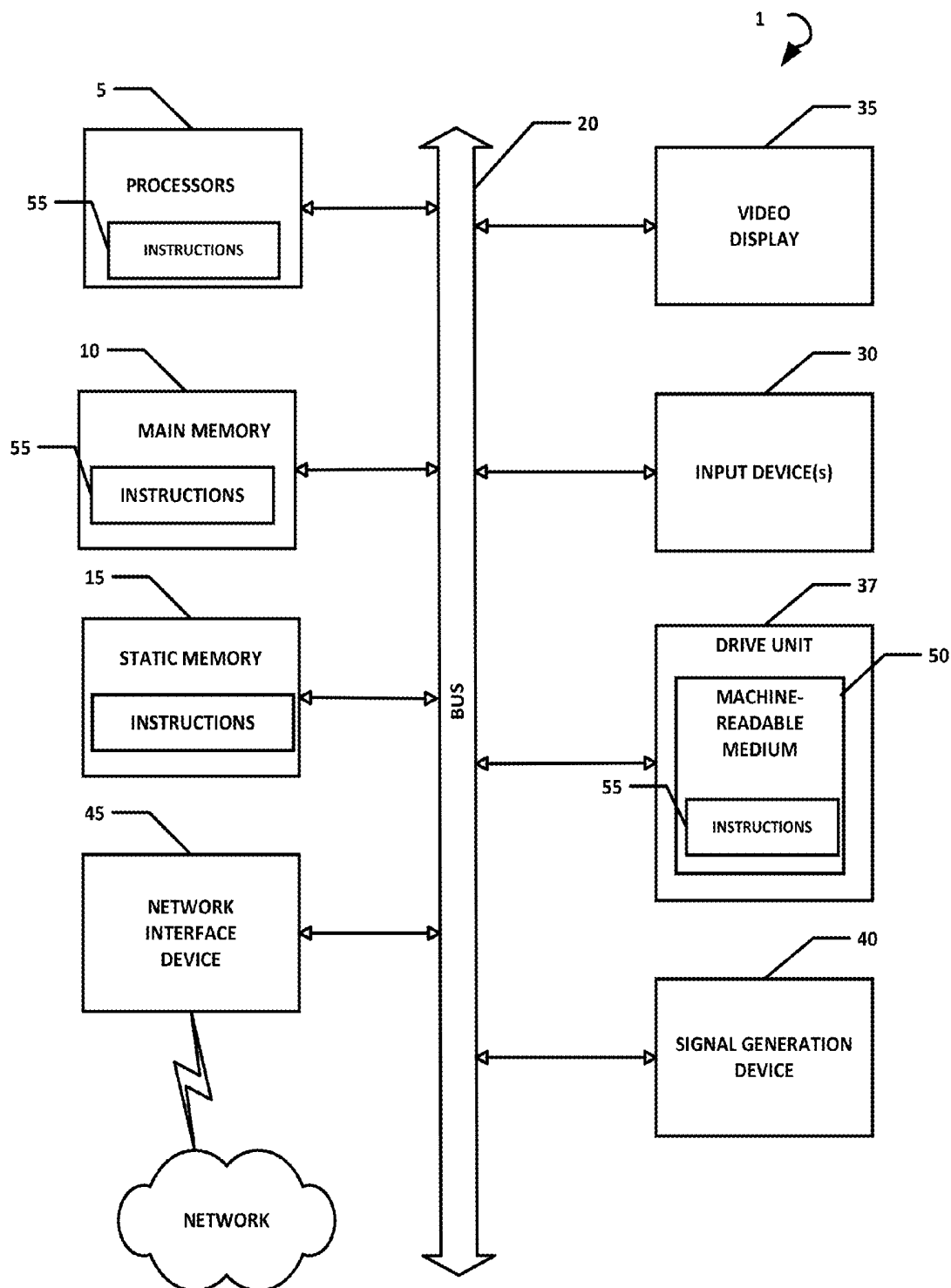

MEDICAL APPARATUSES WITH SELECTIVELY DIMMABLE DISPLAYS

CROSS REFERENCE TO RELATED APPLICATIONS

[0001] This application claims the benefit and priority of U.S. Provisional Application Ser. No. 62/259,025, filed on Nov. 23, 2015, which is hereby incorporated by reference herein including all references and appendices cited therein.

FIELD OF THE INVENTION

[0002] The present technology is directed to medical devices, and more particularly, but not by way of limitation, to apparatuses that comprise selectively dimmable and transparent displays. Methods for controlling the selective dimming of the displays and laser pulse control and selection are also provided herein.

SUMMARY

[0003] According to some embodiments, the present disclosure is directed to an apparatus, comprising: (a) a housing; (b) a laser surgical handpiece device; (c) a laser source that generates laser light that is emitted through the laser surgical handpiece device; (d) an electroluminescent display associated with the housing, the electroluminescent display being configured to display operational settings for the laser source, the operational settings comprising at least power level and pulse width or duration; and (e) a microprocessor for controlling the electroluminescent display to selectively illuminate or dim at least a portion of the operational settings displayed thereon based on the operational settings selected by a user.

[0004] According to some embodiments, the present disclosure is directed to a method, comprising: (a) displaying selectable procedure options that correspond to a plurality of operational modes that each comprises unique combinations of operational settings for a specific medical procedure; (b) receiving user input such as a user scrolling through the plurality of operational modes using inputs on the control panel (or in a touch-based selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display); (c) displaying a preview of selected operational settings on the electroluminescent display; and (d) selectively adjusting the power level of the laser source based on touch-based input received by the selectable dial indicator.

[0005] According to some embodiments, the present disclosure is directed to a method, comprising: (a) addressing each of the traces/plurality of light emitting segments such that the microprocessor can send pulses to each of the traces and therefore into the plurality of light emitting segments; (b) receiving user input such as a selection of an operation mode/setting or user input on the electroluminescent display; (c) selectively adjusting a luminance of the plurality of light emitting segments by applying positive and negative pulses at a specific voltage and at a frequency to selected traces; (d) selectively dimming the plurality of light emitting segments using a pulse skipping scheme; and (e) pulse skipping in subsequent cycles, which changes a frequency of energy pulses resulting in a portion of the light emitting segments being dimmer as more pulses are skipped.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

[0006] Certain embodiments of the present technology are illustrated by the accompanying figures. It will be understood that the figures are not necessarily to scale and that details not necessary for an understanding of the technology or that render other details difficult to perceive may be omitted. It will be understood that the technology is not necessarily limited to the particular embodiments illustrated herein.

[0007] FIG. 1A is a perspective view of an example apparatus constructed in accordance with the present disclosure.

[0008] FIG. 1B is a perspective view of an example printed circuit board for use in accordance with the apparatuses of the present disclosure.

[0009] FIG. 2A is a schematic view of an example electroluminescent display of the present disclosure.

[0010] FIG. 2B is an example control panel use to control the apparatus and display of FIGS. 1A and 2A.

[0011] FIG. 3A illustrates a portion of the electroluminescent display that includes a power dial indicator that can receive touch based input.

[0012] FIG. 3B illustrates a portion of the electroluminescent display having traces and light emitting segments.

[0013] FIG. 4 illustrates several views of a laser handle device of the present disclosure.

[0014] FIG. 5 is a flowchart of an example method of controlling an electroluminescent display of the present disclosure.

[0015] FIG. 6 is a flowchart of another example method of controlling an electroluminescent display of the present disclosure.

[0016] FIG. 7 discloses example code that is used to implement various electroluminescent display control methods.

[0017] FIG. 8 is a schematic of an example computing device, all or portions of which can be used to practice aspects of the present disclosure.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

[0018] Generally, the present disclosure includes medical apparatuses that include selectively dimmable displays. Example medical apparatuses include laser pulse devices used for dental procedures that involve teeth and gum cleaning, as well as oral surgical intervention and repair.

[0019] These apparatuses include selectively dimmable displays, which include, but are not limited to electroluminescent displays. In some embodiments, the electroluminescent displays include transparent displays that are selectively controlled to display selectable laser power and/or laser pulse settings for operating a pulsed laser. In some embodiments, the laser power settings can be associated with specific dental procedures such as frenectomy, gingivectomy, molar exposure, and tooth whitening—just to name a few. To be sure, the apparatuses can utilize selective control of laser power and laser pulse width and/or pulse timing to allow the user to perform various dental procedures.

[0020] FIG. 1A generally illustrates an example medical apparatus 100 that comprises a housing 102, a laser source 103, a control panel 104 supported on the housing 102, a laser surgical handpiece device 106 coupled to the housing 102, and an electroluminescent display 108. In some embodiments, the apparatus 100 is selectively controlled by

use of a foot switch **107**. The foot switch **107** can be used to activate and/or deactivate the delivery of electrical energy from the apparatus **100** after the user has setup the apparatus **100**. Specifics on setting up the apparatus **100** are provided below. In one embodiment, the foot switch **107** can communicatively couple with the apparatus **100** over a wired or wireless link **109**. In some embodiments the foot switch **107** comprises a shroud that prevents accidental laser activation.

[0021] The housing **102** comprises the controlling circuitry that powers and operates aspects of the laser source **103** and the electroluminescent display **108**.

[0022] In some embodiments, the laser surgical handpiece device **106** is coupled with the laser source using a cable that shields and protects a fiber optic (or other) laser guide medium.

[0023] In some embodiments, as illustrated in FIG. 1B, the laser source **103** comprises a laser diode module that generates electrical energy that is delivered through an optical cable to the laser surgical handpiece device **106**, which is described in greater detail infra. The laser source **103** can be mounted onto a printed circuit board **101** that also comprises the microprocessors, power supplies, and other circuit components of the apparatus **100**. The laser diode module **103** is selected from any suitable laser diode module that is capable of producing laser output that is sufficient to perform the medical procedures described herein.

[0024] FIG. 2A illustrates the electroluminescent display **108** in greater detail. FIG. 2B illustrates an example control panel used to select operational aspects of the apparatus **100**. FIGS. 2A and 2B are collectively referred to in the paragraphs below.

[0025] The electroluminescent display **108** can include an at least partially transparent display that illustrates various operational modes for the medical apparatus **100**. In some embodiments, the medical apparatus **100** can provide the user with lists of selectable operational modes **110** organized into categories such as general dentistry, orthodontics, and hygiene. Each of these categories can include individual operational modes such as troughing, fibroma, and so forth. The operational modes will correspond to a specific setting or group of settings that control how the medical apparatus **100** operates. Again, this can include power and/or laser pulse settings. In some embodiments, the operational modes can be listed and ranked according to power level.

[0026] In some embodiments the display **108** is comprises a unique transparent electroluminescent area that can provide extremely high resolution viewing angles from up to 170 degrees of field of view. The display **108** in some embodiments comprises a substrate material having over 80% transparency and an arched configuration of 32 degrees for optimal viewing angle from any direction (other configurations are also likewise contemplated). Illumination of the display **108** is generated by a thin film, less than a micron thick, of specially designed electroluminescent phosphor, which is described in greater detail with respect to FIG. 3B.

[0027] In more detail, the apparatus **100** can implement an electronic key passcode. When the user turns the apparatus on, the passcode key screen will be displayed at the bottom center of the display **108**. The correct passcode sequence should be entered on the control panel **104** as illustrated and described in FIGS. 2A and 2B collectively. For example the passcode can include a series of directional arrow inputs on a navigation pane **113** of the control panel **104**.

[0028] When the apparatus **100** is turned on, and the electronic passcode is properly input the apparatus **100** prompts the user with voice confirmation "Please select wavelength" and two flashing wavelength rings **115** and **117** to select the desired wavelength of choice. The apparatus **100** can operate in three wavelength modes: 810 nm alone, 980 nm alone, or dual wavelength. A wavelength mode is selected before proceeding further, but may be changed at any time.

[0029] In some embodiments, the laser source **103** of the apparatus **100** can output up to a maximum of 2.0 Watts of average power. To adjust the power setting manually, the user can touch the UP and DOWN or the LEFT and RIGHT arrows on the control panel **104**. Each touch of an arrow raises or lowers the power level by 0.1 watts (other increments can be used). Touching and holding an arrow will increase the speed in which the power level is raised or lowered. The user touches the button **119** to put the laser in active mode and depress the foot switch **107** (see FIG. 1) to activate the laser source **103**.

[0030] The ACTIVE/STANDBY button **119** selection serves a dual purpose. It activates (ACTIVE) and deactivates (STANDBY) the laser. By default, the system powers up in Standby mode. The laser source **103** cannot be activated prior to selecting a wavelength in some embodiments. Each time the ACTIVE/STANDBY button **119** is touched, the apparatus **100** toggles between Active and Standby modes. There is an audio confirmation (unless voice confirmation is muted), and an icon for either "ACTIVE" or "STANDBY" is displayed near each wavelength indicator. The red aiming beam and tip illumination of the laser surgical handpiece device **106** are visible only when the laser is in Active mode. These features are described in greater detail below. Thus, in some embodiments, the laser surgical handpiece device **106** can output a colored aiming light that provides a pinpoint dot of light in the direction where the tip of the laser surgical handpiece device **106** will impact.

[0031] When the apparatus **100** is in Active mode, touching any selection other than UP and DOWN or LEFT and RIGHT will return the apparatus **100** to the Standby mode. When the foot switch **107** is depressed in the Active mode, the outer indicator ring around each wavelength ring **115** and **117** on the display **108** flashes to provide a visual indication that the laser surgical handpiece device **106** is firing. The apparatus **100** can also output an audio beep when the laser surgical handpiece device **106** is being fired. For safety purposes, a laser firing delay of 0.25 seconds can be implemented in order to prevent accidental activation.

[0032] In some embodiments a PROCEDURES button **123** is selected to bring up preset or pre-programmed procedures (operational settings) on the display **108**. A collection of pre-programmed procedures will be revealed on the display **108**. Selecting the LEFT and RIGHT arrows will toggle between GENERAL DENTISTRY, ORTHODONTICS or HYGIENE categories. Selecting the UP and DOWN arrows will toggle between procedures within each category. The corresponding power setting for each procedure is displayed on the central numerical power level value **121** when the procedure is highlighted. In some embodiments, the user can customize settings for the apparatus **100** in order to fine tune pre-programmed procedures and/or select settings de novo. The settings can include individual settings for power, pulse width, and the like.

[0033] In some embodiments, users can select volume levels for audible feedback from the apparatus 100 using button 125.

[0034] In one embodiment the user can utilize an aiming light button 127 and the navigation pane 113 to activate the aiming light of the surgical handpiece device 106, while a button 129 is used to activate tip illumination of the laser surgical handpiece device 106.

[0035] The use of dual wavelength laser light can be selected using button 131.

[0036] With respect to specifically programmed operational modes, when a surgeon starts to perform laser procedures for the first time, often it is difficult to know the exact power settings for a particular procedure. Several procedures use different settings and it is almost impossible for the clinician to memorize all power settings, specially, if the clinician performs procedures that broads more than one specialty, such as General Dentistry or Orthodontics.

[0037] The apparatus 100 provides a menu with commonly used procedures already pre-programmed with laser power and pulse settings for that particular procedure. The apparatus 100 is also programmed with specialty features which allow different clinicians from different specialties to have access to pre-set procedures. The correct power, pulse, and frequency (e.g., duration) are already loaded into the display.

[0038] In one embodiment, the user selects the option "Procedures". When selected, the pre-set procedures menu will be displayed on the electroluminescent display 108. As the user toggles between procedures and specialties, a preview of the power settings is shown on the display for easy reading of power.

[0039] A collection of pre-programmed procedures (e.g., operational modes) will be revealed on the display. Selecting the LEFT and RIGHT arrows allows for the user to toggle between GENERAL DENTISTRY, ORTHODONTICS or HYGIENE categories. Selecting the UP and DOWN arrows allows for the user to toggle between procedures within each category. The corresponding power setting for each procedure is displayed on the Power Indicator when the procedure is highlighted.

[0040] The user can also manually select a power or operational level rather than selecting a listed operational mode by tapping or otherwise touching a power indicator dial 112. In some embodiments, the user can utilize a digital or touch input sliders to selectively adjust luminance of a light source within the laser surgical handpiece device 106, as will be described below with respect to FIG. 4.

[0041] In some embodiments, the electroluminescent display 108 is controlled by a plurality of microprocessors that control various segments of the electroluminescent display 108. An example microprocessor is illustrated and described with respect to FIG. 8. In some embodiments, the microprocessors can selectively dim portions of the electroluminescent display 108 to indicate a power level on the power indicator dial 112. For example, a portion of the power indicator dial increments, such as increment 114 are illuminated to a greater extent than remaining increments. By way of example, if troughing is selected as an operational mode, the power indicator dial 112 can brighten indicators that extend to around a power level of 0.07. Indicators above 0.07 are dimmed by the microprocessors compared to the indicators below and equal to 0.07.

[0042] The power level is displayed in a central numerical power level value 121 portion of the display 108.

[0043] With respect to dimming of the electroluminescent display 108, various sectors of the electroluminescent display 108 are controlled by one or more of the microprocessors.

[0044] As background, electroluminescent display technology uses AC current to light up specific segments on a particular display. When a segment is lit, it becomes visible and user can interact with it. However, when user interaction is made with a particular segment, it is difficult to visualize selections or change in settings on the lit display.

[0045] In order to make the process simpler and easier for the user to make selections and interact with the display user interface, the present technology provides methods of dimming a particular segment. By dimming one or more segments of the display while simultaneously brightening other segments, light intensity can be selectively changed and the user can visually apprehend the change.

[0046] FIG. 3A illustrates characters or facets, such as increments, of the user interface that are black (indicating full brightness) and some that are light gray (dimmed). The arch reflects a change when user selects an option to increase power where the segment changes from dimmer to full brightness, demonstrating to the user this particular selection was made. The central numerical power level value 121 portion of the display 108 is located within the power indicator dial 112. The dial 112 comprises power indicator dial increments 141 that ring the central numerical power level value 121. Portions of the power indicator dial increments 141, such as portion 143, can be illuminated at a power level that is greater than a power level used to illuminate portion 145 of the power indicator dial increments 141.

[0047] Electroluminescent technology requires an AC form of energy to be applied to the segments to produce light. The microprocessors for the electroluminescent display 108 apply a positive and negative pulse at a specific voltage, at a certain frequency, which causes one or more segments to be illuminated. Each pulse can be delivered at a certain pulse width, but the total period of the positive and negative pulse can be adjusted.

[0048] Increasing or decreasing the total period of the pulses, changes the frequency and causes the segment to be brighter or dimmer (a differential change in luminance).

[0049] The microprocessors change dimming on each display segment by increasing or decreasing a frequency of energy pulsing through a pulse skipping scheme. The pulse skipping scheme allows for pulses to be skipped in the subsequent cycles, which in turn changes the frequency of energy pulses resulting in segments being dimmer as more pulses are skipped.

[0050] Stated otherwise, the microprocessors cause illumination of light emitting nodes integrated into the display that provide light to the power indicator dial 112, as well as other display features. In order to provide dimming of these light emitting nodes in the sectors, the microprocessors can be configured to skip or pulse power to light emitting nodes that are selected for dimming relative to the light emitting nodes that are selected to be illuminated. It will be understood that the microprocessors can address individual light emitting nodes, which function similarly to a pixel of a video display. Thus, each light emitting node can be addressed using a channel. The microprocessors can pulse energy to

individual light emitting nodes using these dedicated channels. The channels can also be referred to as an electrical trace. The traces extend in vertical lines within the electroluminescent display 108.

[0051] The microprocessors can be configured to maintain an energy pulse rate for the light emitting nodes that are selected to be illuminated and then pulse the light emitting nodes that are selected to be dimmed on a schedule, such as only every sixth cycle. One of ordinary skill in the art will appreciate that other pulse schedules and cycles can be utilized based on the desired luminescence differential between illuminated light emitting nodes and dimmed light emitting nodes.

[0052] Example code/instructions that can be executed by the microprocessors for the electroluminescent display 108 to selectively dim the electroluminescent display 108 are found in FIG. 7.

[0053] FIG. 3B illustrates a section of the electroluminescent display 108. In one embodiment, the electroluminescent display 108 is constructed from a glass substrate 302. To create luminescent segments a plurality of trace lines, such as trace line 304 are formed on the electroluminescent display 108 through deposition a material such as indium tin oxide or other conductive material. The traces can be formed by masking of the glass substrate 302 to create GUI elements, such as the power indicator dial 112 or other characters/icons that are to be illuminated. In some embodiments, portions of the traces that correspond to the characters/icons are coated with a material that illuminates when an electrical charge is applied. For example, the trace lines that form the power level digits 306 are covered or coated with phosphor compound. When an electrical charge is applied to the traces by the microprocessors the phosphor produces light.

[0054] Thus, the terms "light emitting segment" refers to a portion of a trace that comprises the luminescent material, such as phosphor.

[0055] As mentioned above, a tip of the laser surgical handpiece device 106 can be illuminated. When performing surgical oral procedures, one of the most difficult challenges is visibility for the clinician. Often times, when procedures are performed in the back of the oral cavity it presents an additional set of challenges to the oral surgeon, as the lack of light decreases the surgical site visibility making it more difficult for the surgeon.

[0056] In order to improve site visibility and efficacy during an oral surgical procedure, we have created a transparent disposable tip that hosts a set of LED lights for proper illumination of the oral cavity. This disposable tip holds an optical fiber which delivers electrical energy during the surgical procedure. Because the disposable tip is transparent, it allows the LED light to pass thru and illuminate the surgical site.

[0057] A plastic sleeve holds the electronics for the LED which attaches to an aluminum hand piece. This aluminum hand piece threads into the plastic securing the LED system in place. The disposable tip threads into the aluminum piece just in front of the LED. Because the disposable tip is transparent, it allows light to pass thru making this surgical handle become similar to a flashlight.

[0058] FIG. 4 illustrates an example laser surgical handpiece device 106 that comprises an interchangeable/disposable tip 120 and a tubular body 122. The tip 120 comprises a sheath tip 126, a fiber optic conduit 128 extending through

the sheath tip 126, a light emitting cap 130, and an optical ferrule 132. The light emitting cap 130 can comprise an at least partially transparent plastic material that allows light emitted by a light source 136, such as an LED to pass through and illuminate an area forward of the sheath tip 126 and fiber optic conduit 128. In one embodiment, an LED is coupled with a light source 136 and positioned within the tubular body 122. The optical ferrule 132 directs light emitted by the light source into the fiber optic conduit 128.

[0059] According to some embodiments, the light source 136 can be selectively controlled from the control panel 104 to selectively adjust a luminance of the least partially transparent tip. That is, the light emitted by the light source 136 can be adjusted by the end user to a desired luminance level.

[0060] In some embodiments the interchangeable/disposable tip 120 comprises fiber tip 140 that is pre-initiated with a pigment. In some embodiments a black pigment is added to the end of each fiber tip to help focus electrical energy at the tip. Procedures that require removal or cutting of soft tissue can employ an initiated tip, whereas some procedures that call for an un-initiated tip, such as Aphthous Ulcer treatment where no tissue is being removed, do not require a pre-initiated tip. When a procedure calls for an uninitiated tip, the user can rub off the pigment at the end of the fiber tip 140 with gauze and isopropyl alcohol. Again, not all soft-tissue procedures require an initiated, or darkened, tip and contact with tissue. Those procedures that do not require tissue contact will use a fiber tip that is not initiated, because to be effective in non-contact mode, electrical energy must flow unimpeded from the tip into the target tissues. While the above sections describe the specific components and construction of example apparatuses of the present disclosure, the following sections describe example methodologies that relate to the use and/or operation of example apparatuses of the present disclosure.

[0061] FIG. 5 is a flowchart of an example method 500 executed by the microprocessor of the present disclosure. In one embodiment, the method includes a step 502 of displaying selectable procedure options that correspond to a plurality of operational modes that each comprises unique combinations of operational settings for a specific medical procedure. The plurality of operational modes and pre-configured settings are displayed on the electroluminescent display.

[0062] The method further comprises a step 504 of receiving user input such as a user scrolling through the plurality of operational modes using inputs on the control panel (or in a selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display). In response, the method includes a step 506 of displaying a preview of selected operational settings on the electroluminescent display.

[0063] In one embodiment, the power level of the operational settings is displayed within a selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display.

[0064] When selected, the method further includes a step 508 of selectively adjusting the power level of the laser source based on touch-based input received by the selectable dial indicator. This allows a user to fine tune device settings if the user desires to change any of the selected operational settings. Thus, the operational settings provide generalized, procedure-based settings; the user can then fine tune these operational settings for the patient.

[0065] In some embodiments, the selectable dial indicator comprises power indicator dial increments that ring a central numerical power level value display. These dial increments are selectable by the user to set or fine tune a power level.

[0066] When the user has chosen selected operational settings for the apparatus, the method includes a step 510 of selectively illuminating a portion of the power indicator dial increments that correspond to the power level at a first luminance level, while remaining power indicator dial increments are not illuminated or are illuminated with a second luminance level that is less than the first luminance level.

[0067] FIG. 6 is a flowchart of an example method 600 for controlling an electroluminescent display. For context, the electroluminescent display is comprised of a plurality of light emitting segments. In some embodiments groups of light emitting segments are arranged in lines within the electroluminescent display. These lines form characters, icons, or other representations of the display.

[0068] The light emitting segments comprise portions of the traces that have a luminescent coating (such as phosphor). In some embodiments, each of the traces is addressed to the microprocessor.

[0069] In one embodiment, the method comprises a step 602 of addressing each of the traces such that the microprocessor can send pulses to each of the traces and therefore into the plurality of light emitting segments of each of the individual traces.

[0070] The method comprises a step 604 of receiving user input such as a selection of an operation mode/setting or user input on the electroluminescent display, such as when the user taps or swipes across the selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display that controls a power level of the apparatus.

[0071] Thus, the electroluminescent display can comprise a touchscreen layer that is constructed from suitable touchscreen display technology that would be known to one of ordinary skill in the art with the present disclosure before them.

[0072] In one embodiment, the method includes a step 606 of selectively adjusting a luminance of the plurality of light emitting segments by applying positive and negative pulses at a specific voltage and at a frequency to the traces that correspond to the light emitting segments that are to be adjusted. As mentioned above, the positive and negative pulses have a selected pulse width, further wherein a length of the positive and negative pulses are selectively adjusted by the microprocessor.

[0073] In some embodiments, the positive and negative pulses of electrical energy have a fixed pulse width and an adjustable frequency. In one or more embodiments, a period of the positive and negative pulses are selectively controlled by a microprocessor, which effectively changes the frequency of the electrical energy pulses.

[0074] The method includes a step 608 of selectively dimming the plurality of light emitting segments using a pulse skipping scheme. This selective dimming allows for portions of the segments to be illuminated while other portions of the segments are illuminated less or not at all. Again, the power level for a portion of the segments is set at a first luminance level, while other segments are not illuminated or are illuminated with a second luminance level that is less than the first luminance level.

[0075] According to some embodiments, the method includes a step 610 of pulse skipping in subsequent cycles,

which changes a frequency of energy pulses resulting in a portion of the light emitting segments being dimmer as more pulses are skipped.

What is claimed is:

1. An apparatus, comprising:
 - a housing;
 - a laser surgical handpiece device;
 - a laser source that generates laser light that is emitted through the laser surgical handpiece device;
 - an electroluminescent display associated with the housing, the electroluminescent display being configured to display operational settings for the laser source, the operational settings comprising at least power level and pulse width or duration; and
 - a microprocessor for controlling the electroluminescent display to selectively illuminate or dim at least a portion of the operational settings displayed thereon based on the operational settings selected by a user.
2. The apparatus according to claim 1, further comprising a control panel disposed under the electroluminescent display, the control panel comprising inputs for selecting the power level, the pulse width, and the duration.
3. The apparatus according to claim 1, further comprising a fiber optic cable that couples the laser surgical handpiece device with the laser source located within the housing.
4. The apparatus according to claim 1, wherein the microprocessor is configured to provide a plurality of operational modes that each comprise unique combinations of operational settings for a specific medical procedure, the pre-configured settings being displayed as selectable procedure options on the electroluminescent display.
5. The apparatus according to claim 4, wherein as a user scrolls through the plurality of operational modes, a preview of the operational settings are displayed on the electroluminescent display.
6. The apparatus according to claim 5, wherein the power of the operational settings is displayed within a selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display.
7. The apparatus according to claim 6, further comprising selectively adjusting the power of the laser source based on touch-based input received by the selectable dial indicator displayed on the electroluminescent display.
8. The apparatus according to claim 6, wherein the selectable dial indicator comprises power indicator dial increments that ring a central numerical power level value display.
9. The apparatus according to claim 8, wherein controlling the electroluminescent display comprises selectively illuminating a portion of the power indicator dial increments

that correspond to the power level at a first luminance level, while remaining power indicator dial increments are not illuminated or are illuminated with a second luminance level that is less than the first luminance level.

10. The apparatus according to claim 1, wherein the electroluminescent display comprises a plurality of light emitting segments, wherein the microprocessor can selectively adjust a luminance of the plurality of light emitting segments by applying positive and negative pulses to an associated trace at a specific voltage and at a frequency.

11. The apparatus according to claim 10, wherein the positive and negative pulses have a fixed pulse width and an adjustable frequency, further where in a period of the positive and negative pulses are selectively controlled by the microprocessor, which effectively changes the frequency.

12. The apparatus according to claim 10, wherein each of the plurality of light emitting segments of the trace is addressed using a channel.

13. The apparatus according to claim 12, wherein the channel comprises traces that extend along lines of the electroluminescent display, wherein the traces each comprise a conductive material that is deposited on a glass substrate of the electroluminescent display, wherein the conductive material is at least partially coated with an phosphor that illuminates when an electrical charge is applied to the trace.

14. The apparatus according to claim 10, wherein the microprocessor selectively dims the plurality of light emitting segments using a pulse skipping scheme.

15. The apparatus according to claim 14, wherein the pulse skipping scheme allows for pulse skipping in subsequent cycles, which changes a frequency of energy pulses resulting in a portion of the light emitting segments being dimmer as more pulses are skipped.

16. The apparatus according to claim 1, wherein the laser surgical handpiece device comprises:

- a handle; and
- a light source disposed within the handle.

17. The apparatus according to claim 16, further comprising an at least partially transparent tip that emits light from the light source, the transparent tip comprising a centrally located fiber that emits laser output of the laser source, wherein the light source is controlled so as to selectively adjust a luminance of the least partially transparent tip.

18. The apparatus according to claim 17, further comprising a fiber optic conduit and an optical ferrule that directs light emitted by the light source into the fiber optic conduit and towards the at least partially transparent tip.

19. The apparatus according to claim 18, wherein a tip of the at least partially transparent tip is pre-initiated with pigment to focus electrical energy.
