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(54) **METHODS FOR DETECTING ATRIAL TACHYARRHYTHMIA IN IMPLANTABLE DEVICES WITHOUT DEDICATED ATRIAL SENSING**

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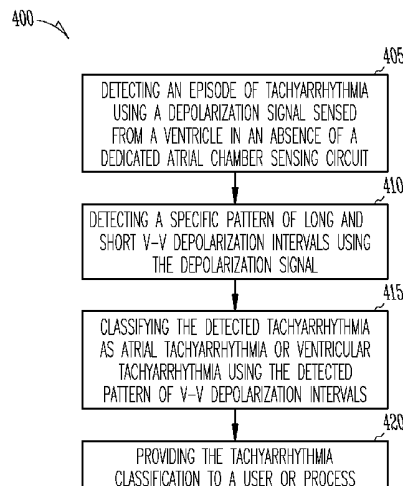
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(57) **ABSTRACT**

An apparatus comprises an implantable cardiac signal sensing circuit configured to provide a sensed depolarization signal from a ventricle and a processor. The processor includes a signal analyzer module and a tachyarrhythmia discrimination module. The signal analyzer module is configured to determine a measure of stability of ventricular (V-V) depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal, and determine a rate of change of the measure of stability. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to detect an episode of tachyarrhythmia using the depolarization signal, determine whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is indicative of atrial tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change, and provide the determination to a user or process.

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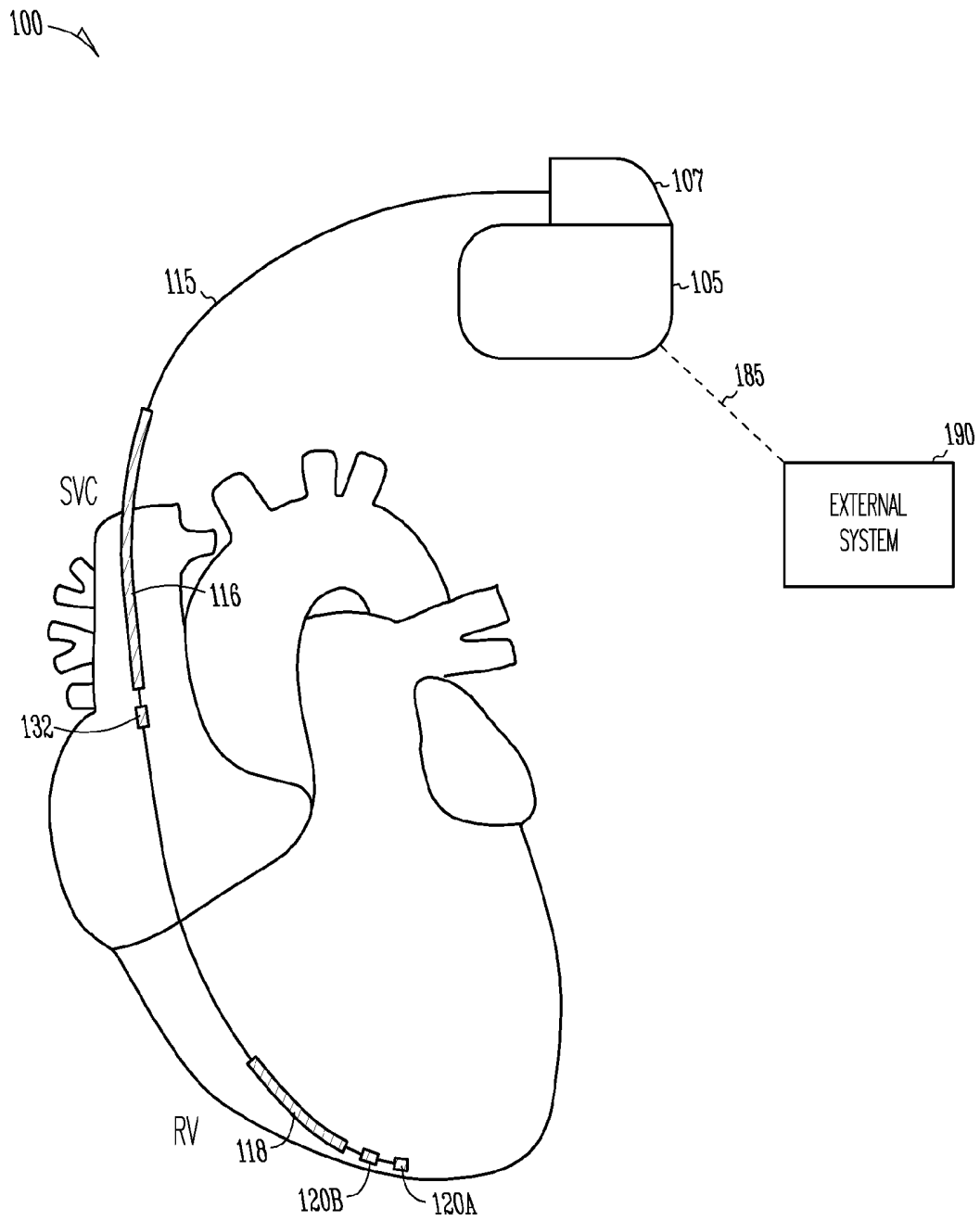
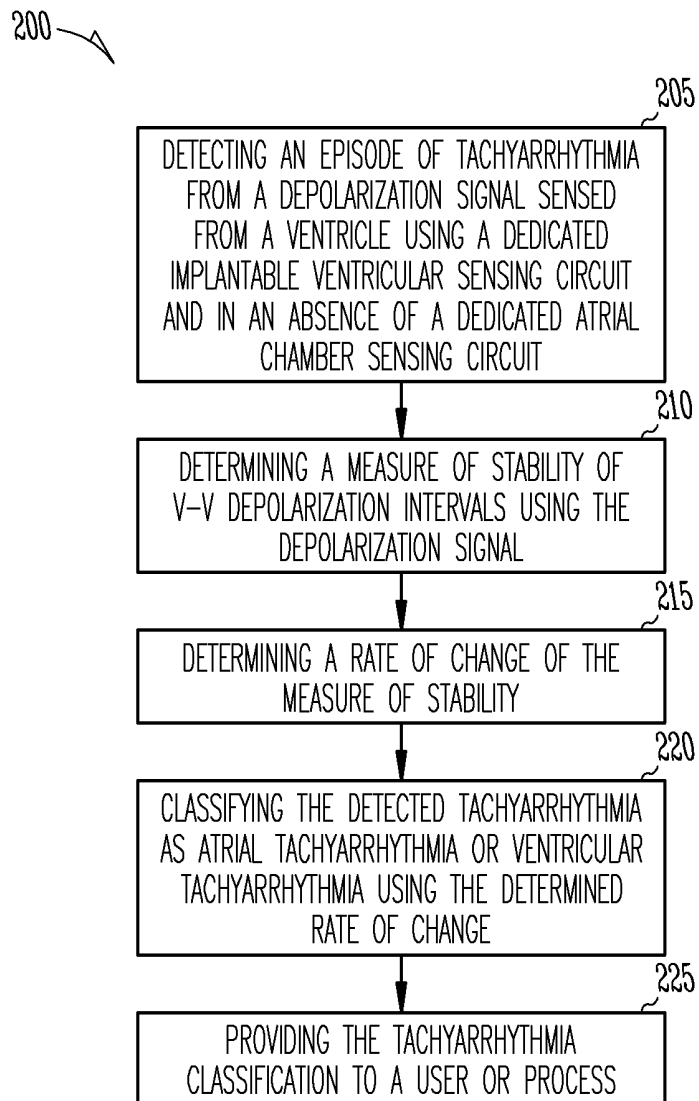
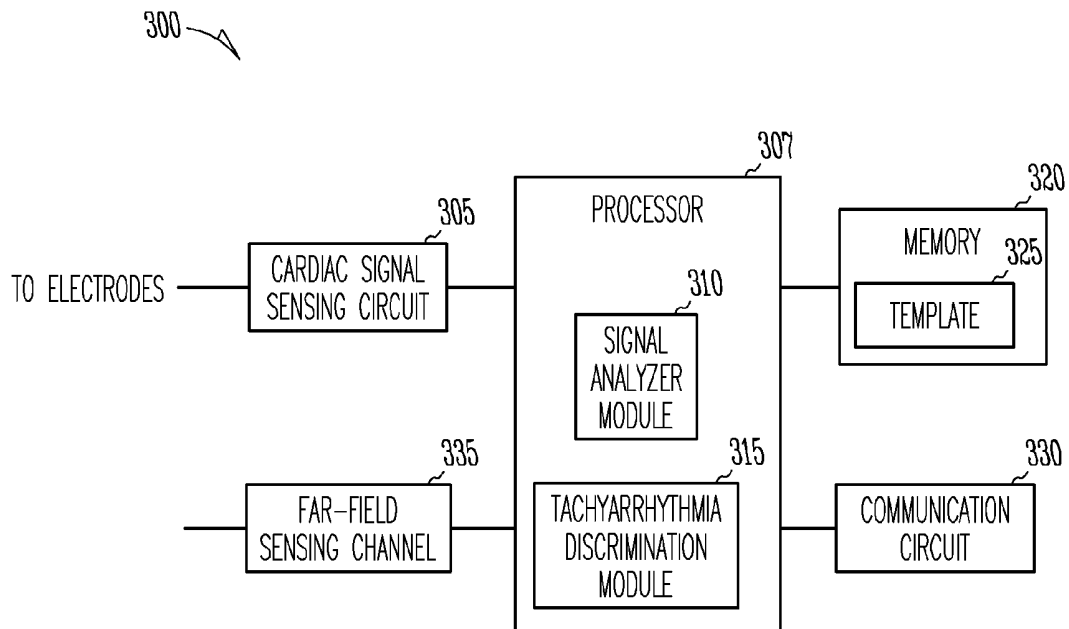
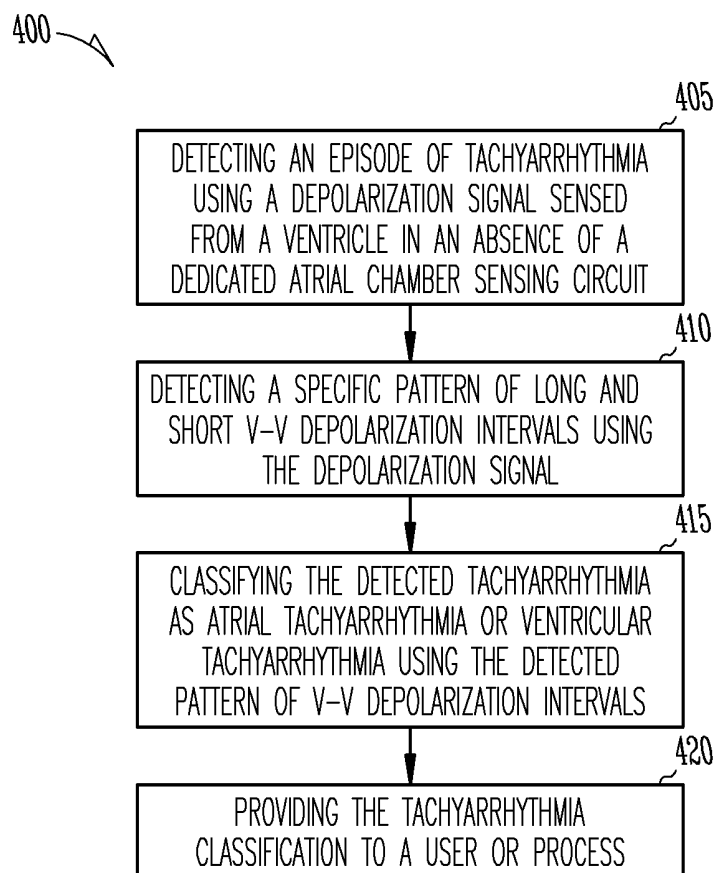
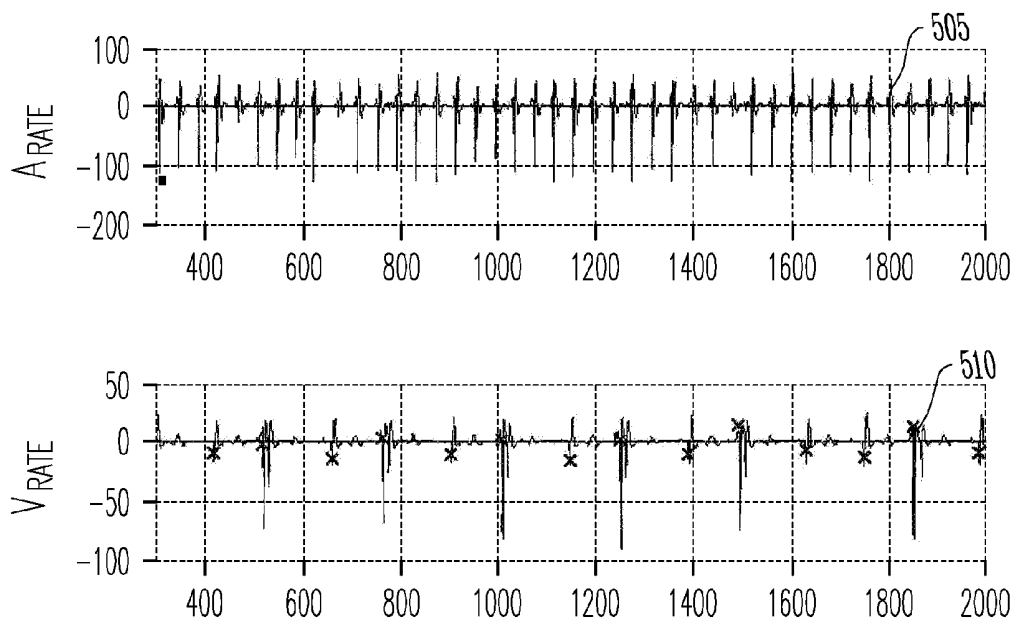

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METHODS FOR DETECTING ATRIAL TACHYARRHYTHMIA IN IMPLANTABLE DEVICES WITHOUT DEDICATED ATRIAL SENSING

CROSS REFERENCE TO RELATED APPLICATION

This application claims the benefit of U.S. Provisional Application No. 61/171,739, filed on Apr. 22, 2009, under 35 U.S.C. §119(e), which is hereby incorporated by reference.

BACKGROUND

Implantable medical devices (IMDs) include devices designed to be implanted into a patient. Some examples of these devices include cardiac function management (CFM) devices such as implantable pacemakers, implantable cardioverter defibrillators (ICDs), cardiac resynchronization therapy devices (CRTs), and devices that include a combination of such capabilities. The devices can be used to treat patients using electrical or other therapy or to aid a physician or caregiver in patient diagnosis through internal monitoring of a patient's condition. The devices may include one or more electrodes in communication with one or more sense amplifiers to monitor electrical heart activity within a patient, and often include one or more sensors to monitor one or more other internal patient parameters. Other examples of implantable medical devices include implantable diagnostic devices, implantable drug delivery systems, or implantable devices with neural stimulation capability.

Additionally, some IMDs detect events by monitoring electrical heart activity signals. In CFM devices, these events can include heart chamber expansions or contractions. By monitoring cardiac signals indicative of expansions or contractions, IMDs can detect abnormally slow heart rate, or bradycardia. Some IMDs detect abnormally rapid heart rate, or tachyarrhythmia. Tachyarrhythmia includes ventricular tachycardia (VT) and supraventricular tachycardia (SVT). Tachyarrhythmia also includes rapid and irregular heart rate, or fibrillation, including ventricular fibrillation (VF).

When detected, ventricular tachyarrhythmia can be terminated with high-energy shock therapy delivered with an ICD. Cardioversion/defibrillation therapy can cause patient discomfort and consumes a relatively large amount of battery power which may lead to a shortened useful device lifetime. Some ICDs are single chamber devices that sense cardiac signals and deliver therapy to a single heart chamber (e.g., the right ventricle). However, ICD patients may develop atrial arrhythmias. Atrial tachyarrhythmia includes atrial fibrillation (AF) and atrial tachycardia (AT). Atrial tachyarrhythmia with a fast ventricular response (e.g., resulting in a fast ventricular rate) is often a cause of inappropriate shocks by an ICD.

OVERVIEW

This document relates generally to systems, devices, and methods for monitoring cardiac electrophysiological parameters of a patient or subject. Episodes of atrial and ventricular tachyarrhythmia are also monitored.

In example 1, an apparatus includes an implantable cardiac signal sensing circuit configured to provide a sensed depolarization signal from a ventricle and a processor communicatively coupled to the cardiac signal sensing circuit.

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The processor includes a signal analyzer module and a tachyarrhythmia discrimination module. The signal analyzer module is configured to determine a measure of stability of ventricular (V-V) depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal, and determine a rate of change of the measure of stability. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to detect an episode of tachyarrhythmia using the depolarization signal, determine whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is indicative of atrial tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change, and provide the determination to a user or process.

In example 2, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module of example 1 is optionally configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability exceeds an atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

In example 3, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module of examples 1 and 2 is optionally configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as ventricular tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability is greater than a ventricular tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold and is less than the atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

In example 4, the signal analyzer module of examples 1-3 is optionally configured to determine a rate of change of the measure of stability when a ventricular depolarization rate or interval satisfies a specified threshold rate or threshold interval value. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies the specified threshold value, and classify the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the measure of stability otherwise.

In example 5, the apparatus of examples 1-4 optionally includes a memory communicatively coupled to the processor and configured to store a signal morphology template, and a far-field sensing channel configured to provide a far-field atrial and ventricular signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium or ventricle. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to, upon determining the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate sensing of the far-field signal, initiate a comparison of a morphology of the sensed far-field signal to a stored morphology template by the signal analyzer module, and confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

In example 6, the signal analyzer module of example 5 is optionally configured to calculate a measure of similarity between a segment of the far-field signal and the morphology template which is representative of normal sinus rhythm, and calculate a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold and the variance of the measure of similarity is within a variance range.

In example 7, the stored morphology template of examples 5 and 6 is optionally associated with atrial tachyarrhythmia.

In example 8, apparatus of examples 1-7 optionally includes a memory and a communication circuit communicatively coupled to the processor. The communication circuit is configured to communicate information wirelessly with a second separate device. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia

mia, initiate storage of a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected tachyarrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, initiate storage of a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals, and communicate the stored segment and histogram to a second device.

In example 9, the apparatus of examples 1-4 optionally includes a far-field sensing channel configured to provide a far-field atrial signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium, a memory communicatively coupled to the processor, and a communication circuit, communicatively coupled to the processor, configured to communicate information wirelessly with a second separate device. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate storage of a segment of the sensed far-field signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, communicate the stored segment to the second device for comparison of a far-field signal morphology to a morphology template, and receive an indication whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia from the second device.

In example 10, a method includes detecting an episode of tachyarrhythmia from a depolarization signal sensed from a ventricle using a dedicated implantable ventricular sensing circuit and in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit, determining a measure of stability of V-V depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal, determining a rate of change of the measure of stability, classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change, and providing the tachyarrhythmia classification to a user or process.

In example 11, the classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia of example 10 optionally includes classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability exceeds an atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

In example 12, the classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia of examples 10 and 11 optionally includes classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as ventricular tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability is greater than a ventricular tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold and is less than the atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

In example 13, the determining a rate of change of the measure of stability of examples 10-12 optionally includes determining a rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies a threshold rate or interval value. The classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia optionally includes classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies the threshold rate or interval value, and classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the measure of stability otherwise.

In example 14, the method of examples 10-13 optionally includes, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, sensing a second signal using a far-field sensing channel and comparing a morphology of the second sensed signal to a morphology template. The classifying the tachyarrhythmia optionally includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

In example 15, the classifying the tachyarrhythmia of example 14 optionally includes calculating a measure of

similarity between a segment of the second signal and the morphology template, wherein the morphology template is representative of normal sinus rhythm, calculating a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity. The confirming the classification optionally includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold and the variance of the measure of similarity is within a variance range.

In example 16, the classifying the tachyarrhythmia of example 14 optionally includes, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, storing a segment of the second signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold. The comparing a morphology optionally includes communicating the stored segment from a first implantable medical device to a second device and comparing the morphology of the second sensed signal to the morphology template using the second device, and the classification optionally includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison by the second device.

In example 17, the comparing a morphology of the second signal of examples 14-16 optionally includes comparing a morphology of the second sensed signal to a morphology template associated with atrial tachyarrhythmia.

In example 18, the method of examples 10-17 optionally includes, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, storing a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected tachyarrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, storing a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals, and communicating the stored segment and histogram from an implantable medical device to a second device.

In example 19, an apparatus includes an implantable cardiac signal sensing circuit, configured to provide a sensed depolarization signal from a ventricle, and a processor. The processor is communicatively coupled to the cardiac signal sensing circuit and includes a signal analyzer module configured to measure V-V depolarization intervals and a tachyarrhythmia discrimination module configured to detect an episode of tachyarrhythmia using the measured V-V depolarization intervals, detect a sudden presence of long and short V-V depolarization intervals, classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using a detected pattern of long and short V-V depolarization intervals, and provide the tachyarrhythmia classification to a user or process.

In example 20, the apparatus of example 19 optionally includes a memory communicatively coupled to the processor and configured to store a signal morphology template and a far-field sensing channel configured to provide a far-field atrial and ventricular signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium or ventricle. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate sensing of the far-field signal, and initiate a comparison a morphology of the far-field signal to a stored morphology template by the signal analyzer module, and confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

In example 21, the signal analyzer module of examples 19 and 20 is optionally configured to calculate a measure of similarity between a segment of the far-field signal and the morphology template, wherein the stored morphology template is representative of normal sinus rhythm, and calculate

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a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold, the variance of the measure of similarity is within a variance range, and the depolarization rate or interval satisfies a rate or interval detection threshold.

In example 22, the apparatus of examples 19-21 optionally includes a memory and a communication circuit communicatively coupled to the processor. The communication circuit is configured to communicate information wirelessly with a second separate device. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is optionally configured to, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate storage of a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, initiate storage of a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals, and communicate the stored segment and histogram from an implantable medical device to a second device.

In example 23, a method includes detecting an episode of tachyarrhythmia using a depolarization signal sensed from a ventricle in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit, detecting a sudden presence of long and short V-V depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal, classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using a detected pattern of long and short V-V depolarization intervals, and providing the tachyarrhythmia classification to a user or process.

In example 24, the method of example 23 optionally includes, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, sensing a second signal using a far-field sensing channel, and comparing a morphology of the second sensed signal to a morphology template. The classifying the tachyarrhythmia optionally includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

In example 25, the method of example 23 and 24 optionally includes, upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, storing a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, storing a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals, and communicating the stored segment and histogram from an implantable medical device to a second device.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF THE DRAWINGS

In the drawings, which are not necessarily drawn to scale, like numerals may describe similar components in different views. Like numerals having different letter suffixes may represent different instances of similar components. The drawings illustrate generally, by way of example, but not by way of limitation, various embodiments discussed in the present document.

FIG. 1 is an illustration of an example of portions of a system that includes an IMD.

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FIG. 2 is a flow diagram of an example of a method of detecting and classifying atrial tachyarrhythmia using an IMD.

FIG. 3 is a block diagram of portions of an example of an IMD to detect and classify atrial tachyarrhythmia.

FIG. 4 is a flow diagram of an example of a method of detecting atrial tachyarrhythmia using an IMD that does not have dedicated atrial sensing circuits.

FIG. 5 shows an example of a characteristic pattern of V-V intervals during an AF episode.

DETAILED DESCRIPTION

This document discusses systems and methods for improved detection of cardiac events by an IMD. Specifically systems and methods for improved discrimination or classification of tachyarrhythmia by an IMD are described.

An implantable medical device (IMD) may include one or more of the features, structures, methods, or combinations thereof described herein. For example, a cardiac monitor or a cardiac stimulator may be implemented to include one or more of the advantageous features or processes described below. It is intended that such a monitor, stimulator, or other implantable or partially implantable device need not include all of the features described herein, but may be implemented to include selected features that provide for unique structures or functionality. Such a device may be implemented to provide a variety of therapeutic or diagnostic functions.

FIG. 1 is an illustration of an example of portions of a system **100** that includes an IMD **105**. Examples of IMD **105** include, without limitation, a pacemaker, a cardioverter, a defibrillator, and other cardiac monitoring and therapy delivery devices, including cardiac devices that include or work in coordination with one or more neuro-stimulating devices, drugs, drug delivery systems, or other therapies. In an example, the system **100** shown is used to treat a cardiac arrhythmia. The IMD **105** typically includes an electronics unit coupled by one or more cardiac leads **115** to a heart of a patient or subject. The electronics unit of the IMD **105** typically includes components that are enclosed in a hermetically-sealed housing sometimes referred to as a canister or "can." The system **100** also typically includes an IMD programmer or other external system **190** that communicates one or more wireless signals **185** with the IMD **105**, such as by using radio frequency (RF) or by one or more other telemetry methods.

The example shown includes a right ventricular (RV) lead **115** having a proximal end and a distal end. The proximal end is coupled to a header connector **107**. The distal end is configured for placement in the RV. The RV lead **115** can include one or more of a proximal defibrillation electrode **116**, a distal defibrillation electrode **118** (e.g., RV Coil), an RV tip electrode **120A**, and an RV ring electrode **120B**. The defibrillation electrode **116** is generally incorporated into the lead body such as in a location suitable for supraventricular placement in the superior vena cava (e.g., SVC Coil). In some examples, the RV lead **115** includes a ring electrode **132** (e.g., SVC ring) in the vicinity of the proximal defibrillation electrode **116**. The defibrillation electrode **118** is incorporated into the lead body near the distal end, such as for placement in the RV. The RV electrodes **120A** and **120B** can form a bipolar electrode pair and are generally incorporated into the lead body at the lead distal end. The electrodes **116**, **118**, **120A**, and **120B** are each electrically coupled to IMD **105**, such as through one or more conductors extending within the lead body. The proximal defibrillation electrode **116**, distal defibrillation electrode **118**, or an

electrode formed on the can of IMD **105** allow for delivery of cardioversion or defibrillation pulses to the heart.

The RV tip electrode **120A**, RV ring electrode **120B**, or an electrode formed on the can of IMD **105** allow for sensing an RV electrogram signal representative of RV depolarizations and delivering RV pacing pulses. In some examples, the IMD includes a sense amplifier circuit to provide amplification or filtering of the sensed signal. Sensing and pacing allows the IMD **105** to adjust timing of the heart chamber contractions.

Some IMDs, such as shown in FIG. **1**, may not include an electrode for sensing electrical activity in an atrium. For example, the IMD **105** can be an ICD with single ventricular chamber sensing. The ICD can include an electrode attached to a single ventricular lead, and use intrinsic cardiac signals sensed with the ventricular electrode for arrhythmia detection and discrimination (e.g., by rate sensing and/or depolarization signal morphology analysis). The absence of sensing intrinsic atrial depolarizations (P-waves) may make arrhythmia detection perform less well than a dual chamber ICD (e.g., an ICD including a lead for placement in an atrium and a lead for placement in a ventricle).

Lack of atrial sensing makes it difficult for a clinician to retrospectively diagnose atrial tachyarrhythmia such as atrial fibrillation (AF) and atrial tachycardia (AT). Yet, AF/AT detection has important diagnostic value. The time that a patient spends in AF is sometimes called an AF burden. A device estimate of the AF burden is useful to a clinician to determine which anti-arrhythmic therapy or therapies to use, or which anticoagulant therapy or therapies to prescribe. Detection of AF is also useful for discriminating between AF and VT. And, as set forth above, occurrences of AT or AF with a fast ventricular response is a major cause of inappropriate shocks.

FIG. **2** is a flow diagram of an example of a method **200** of detecting and classifying atrial tachyarrhythmia using an IMD that does not have dedicated atrial sensing circuits.

At block **205**, an episode of tachyarrhythmia is detected using a device such as an IMD. The tachyarrhythmia is detected from a cardiac depolarization signal sensed from a ventricle using a dedicated implantable ventricular sensing circuit and in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit. For instance, the depolarization signal may be sensed using bipolar electrodes **120A** and **120B** and a sense amplifier as discussed above in regard to FIG. **1**, or the depolarization signal may be sensed as part of a wireless ECG which uses electrodes formed on the IMD housing. In certain examples, the device senses cardiac depolarization signals and detects tachyarrhythmia by detecting a depolarization rate that exceeds a tachyarrhythmia detection rate threshold.

At block **210**, a measure of stability of ventricular depolarization (V-V) intervals is determined using the depolarization signal. In certain examples, the V-V intervals are measured by detecting R-waves in the depolarization signal and measuring the intervals between R-waves (i.e., RR intervals). R-waves of the QRS wave complex are indicative of depolarization of the ventricles.

The measure of stability indicates the variability of V-V interval differences. In some examples of a stability measurement, pair-wise differences of V-V intervals are calculated ($\Delta V-V$). When a tachyarrhythmia episode is detected, the stability measurement is initialized using an average of a specified number (e.g., four) V-V interval differences. The stability is then calculated on the fly during the episode. In certain examples, when a new V-V interval is detected, a current difference in the V-V interval is calculated and the

stability measurement is calculated as the current difference minus the average of the previous differences.

In certain examples, a weighted stability calculation is used to assess stability. The stability measurement (S) is a weighted sum of the previous stability measurement and the current stability measurement. As an illustrative example, if weights of $\frac{7}{8}$ and $\frac{1}{8}$ are used, then

$$(S)_{CURRENT} = \frac{7}{8} * (S)_{PREVIOUS} + \frac{1}{8} * (\Delta V - V). \quad (1)$$

If the V-V intervals are stable then the V-V intervals are uniform and the differences will approach zero. If the V-V intervals are unstable, then the calculated differences will be greater than zero. The V-V intervals are declared to be unstable if the weighted stability calculation exceeds a predetermined threshold value.

Examples of methods and systems to detect arrhythmia and assess the stability of the rhythms are found in Gilkerson et al., U.S. Pat. No. 6,493,579, entitled "System and Method for Detection Enhancement Programming," filed Aug. 20, 1999, which is incorporated herein by reference in its entirety.

For an atrial tachyarrhythmia such as AF, the V-V intervals will be irregular. Therefore, an atrial tachyarrhythmia is detectable without dedicated atrial sensing circuits by analysis of the V-V intervals. However, tachyarrhythmia discrimination is complicated by the fact that V-V interval instability is not specific to atrial tachyarrhythmia. VT can be irregular as well (e.g., at slower depolarization rates). Also, anti-arrhythmic drugs may cause monomorphic VT (MVT) to become markedly irregular. Thus, VT may be misclassified as atrial tachyarrhythmia (and vice versa) in some circumstances.

A better approach is to monitor a rate of change of V-V interval stability and use the rate of change in discrimination between different forms of tachyarrhythmia. At block **215**, a rate of change of the measure of stability is determined. In some examples, the rate of change of stability (dS/dt) is calculated as approximately equal to

$$|S_n - S_{n-k}|/k, \quad (3)$$

where n and k are numbers of V-V intervals and $k < n$.

The rate of change indicates how the stability varies during the detected tachyarrhythmia. For atrial tachyarrhythmia such as AF/AT, the onset of the tachyarrhythmia usually occurs with a sudden change in the V-V stability calculation. Because the stability calculation tends to be near zero for a stable rhythm, the value of the stability calculation will exhibit a sudden increase for AF/AT. For many VTs, the V-V stability calculation gradually changes to a value that indicates instability. Thus, a measure of the change in S with time (or a change over k intervals) is a way to differentiate between AF/AT and VT.

At block **220**, the detected tachyarrhythmia is classified as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change. At block **225**, the tachyarrhythmia classification is provided to a user or process.

FIG. **3** is a block diagram **300** of portions of an example of an IMD **300** to detect and classify atrial tachyarrhythmia. The IMD **300** includes an implantable cardiac signal sensing circuit **305** designed for sensing electrical depolarization signals in a ventricle, such as when the coupled to an electrode shaped and sized to be placed in or near a ventricle of a subject. It is to be noted that the IMD does not include dedicated atrial sensing circuits.

The IMD **300** also includes a processor **307** communicatively coupled to the cardiac signal sensing circuit **305**. The processor **307** may be a digital signal processor, ASIC,

microprocessor, or other type of processor. Functions and algorithms performed by the processor correspond to modules, which are software, hardware, firmware or any combination thereof. Multiple functions may be performed in one or more modules as desired, and the embodiments described are merely examples. The communicative coupling allows the cardiac signal sensing circuit 305 and the processor 307 to communicate even though there may be intervening circuits between them. For example, the cardiac signal sensing circuit 305 converts sensed cardiac depolarizations into electrical signals and the electrical signals may be quantified for the processor using analog to digital (A/D) converters.

The processor 307 includes a signal analyzer module 310 configured to determine a measure of stability of V-V intervals using the depolarization signal. In some examples, the signal analyzer module 310 determines a weighted stability calculation. The signal analyzer module 310 also determines a rate of change of the measure of stability.

The processor 307 further includes a tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 to detect an episode of tachyarrhythmia using the depolarization signal, such as when detecting a depolarization rate that exceeds a tachyarrhythmia detection rate threshold for example. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 then determines whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is indicative of atrial tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change of stability, and provides the determination to a user or process. In some examples, the classification may be used by the IMD 300 to begin an anti-tachyarrhythmia treatment such as anti-tachycardia pacing (ATP) or delivery of an anti-tachyarrhythmia drug. In some examples, the classification is communicated to an external device, such as an IMD programmer or advanced patient management (APM) system.

In some examples, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 classifies the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability exceeds an atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold. In some examples, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 is configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as ventricular tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability is greater than a ventricular tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold and is less than the atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold. This reflects the sudden change in stability evident during an onset of atrial tachyarrhythmia versus the gradual change in stability evident during an onset of ventricular tachyarrhythmia.

According to some examples, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 may use the measure of V-V stability (S) or the rate of change of the measure of stability (dS/dt) to classify the tachyarrhythmia, depending on the detected depolarization rate. Classifying atrial tachyarrhythmia using S may be more reliable at tachyarrhythmia of lower rates while using dS/dt may be more reliable at higher rates.

Thus in some examples, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 classifies the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies the specified threshold value (e.g., >170 beats per minute (bpm)), and classifies the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the measure of stability otherwise (e.g., <170 bpm). The signal analyzer module 310 determines a rate of change of the measure of stability when a ventricular depolarization rate or

interval satisfies a specified threshold rate or threshold interval value (e.g., a rate >170 bpm, or a V-V interval <350 ms).

In certain examples, the actual depolarization rate threshold used as the cutoff between the use of S or dS/dt may be made programmable in the device and selected by a clinician. In certain examples, the threshold is an absolute threshold set internally in the IMD and is not programmable. In certain examples, the threshold is dynamic and is a percentage of a running V-V interval average. In certain examples, the threshold is characterized for each individual patient.

In some examples, once the tachyarrhythmia is classified, the IMD 300 gathers statistics about the tachyarrhythmia. In certain examples, the IMD 300 includes a memory 320 and a communication circuit 330 communicatively coupled to the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315. The communication circuit 330 communicates information wirelessly with a second separate device. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 initiates storage of a segment of the depolarization signal upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia and when a duration of the detected tachyarrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 also initiates storage of a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 communicates the stored segment and histogram to a second device at a later time. In certain examples, the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals in the histogram data.

The IMD 300 may gather other statistics as well, such as a duration of the atrial tachyarrhythmia for example, which may also be communicated to a second device. In certain examples, the second device is part of an advanced patient management (APM) system and is able to communicate wirelessly with the IMD as well as communicate with other devices over a computer network such as the internet or a cellular phone network. In certain examples, a clinician can choose (e.g., by programming) a trigger condition of the statistics that causes the APM system to send out an alert, such as when the duration exceeds a predetermined threshold duration for example.

In some examples, the second device may include a display or may relay the histogram to a third device having a display. The histogram data may be displayed with an indication (e.g., a color code) so the clinician can clearly see the difference in ventricular response when the patient is in atrial tachyarrhythmia. In certain examples, the histogram data is sorted into an AF histogram or an AT histogram. In certain examples, the histogram includes a rate histogram as well as trending of the ventricular rate stability.

According to some examples, once a tachyarrhythmia has been classified, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 confirms the classification with further analysis.

In certain examples, the IMD 300 uses a signal morphology analysis to confirm the tachyarrhythmia classification. The memory 320 stores a depolarization signal morphology template 325. In certain examples, the signal morphology template is stored in the memory 320 as a data structure. The IMD 300 also includes a far-field sensing channel 335 that provides a sensed far-field atrial and ventricular signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium or ventricle. The sensed far-field signal is a more global representation of activity in the atria and ventricles than a near-field signal or signals. In some examples, the far-field sensing channel includes a unipolar sensing vector.

Returning to FIG. 1, in some examples, the unipolar sensing vector includes the coil electrode **116** configured to be placed in or near an SVC and an electrode incorporated into the housing or the header of the IMD **105**. In some examples, the unipolar sensing vector includes the distal defibrillation electrode **118** and an electrode incorporated into the housing or the header of the IMD **105**. In some examples, the unipolar sensing vector includes a ring electrode **132** configured to be placed in or near the SVC and the electrode incorporated into the housing or the header of the IMD **105**. In some examples, the far-field sensing channel **335** is a far-field atrial sensing channel and includes the SVC coil electrode **116** and the SVC ring electrode **132**.

The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** initiates sensing of the far-field signal upon determining that the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** then initiates a comparison of a morphology of the sensed far-field signal to the stored morphology template **325** by the signal analyzer module **310**. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** confirms the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

In some examples, the stored morphology template **325** is associated with atrial tachyarrhythmia. The signal analyzer module **310** calculates a measure of similarity between a segment of the sensed far-field signal and the morphology template **325**. If the measure of similarity exceeds a threshold value, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** deems the detected tachyarrhythmia to be atrial tachyarrhythmia.

In some examples, the stored morphology template **325** is associated with normal sinus rhythm (NSR). The signal analyzer module **310** calculates a measure of similarity between a segment of the sensed far-field signal and the morphology template, and calculates a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination circuit is confirms the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold and the variance of the measure of similarity is within a predetermined variance range.

In some examples, at least a portion of the signal processing is performed by a second device. This offloads the processing demand of the signal analyses from the IMD **300** to another device. Upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia and when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** again initiates storage of a segment of the sensed far-field signal. Instead of the IMD **300** performing the additional analysis to confirm the classification of the detected tachyarrhythmia, information is communicated to second device for the analysis.

For instance, if the additional analysis is morphology comparison, the stored segment is communicated to second device for comparison of a far-field signal morphology to a morphology template stored at the second device. The IMD **300** receives an indication whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia from the second device via the communication circuit **330**. If the indication is a confirmation of atrial tachyarrhythmia, the classification may be used by the IMD **300** to begin an anti-tachyarrhythmia treatment or the IMD **300** may begin gathering the previously described statistics.

According to some examples, V-V pattern recognition is used to detect atrial tachyarrhythmia in the absence of dedicated atrial sensing circuitry. Alternating patterns of

long and short V-V intervals can be recognized as being indicative of atrial tachyarrhythmia.

FIG. 4 is a flow diagram of an example of a method **400** of detecting atrial tachyarrhythmia using an IMD that does not have dedicated atrial sensing circuits. At block **405**, an episode of tachyarrhythmia is detected using a device such as an IMD. The tachyarrhythmia is detected from a cardiac depolarization signal sensed from a ventricle using a dedicated implantable ventricular sensing circuit and in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit. For example, the depolarization signal may be sensed using bipolar electrodes **120A** and **120B** and a sense amplifier as discussed above in regard to FIG. 1. In certain examples, the device senses cardiac depolarization signals and detects tachyarrhythmia by detecting a depolarization rate that exceeds a tachyarrhythmia detection rate threshold.

At block **410**, a sudden presence of long and short V-V depolarization intervals is detected using the depolarization signal. The sudden presence of a characteristic pattern of short V-V intervals mixed with longer intervals may be an indication of an atrial tachyarrhythmia event such as AF. For example, the V-V intervals can have a pattern of "short-long-short-long, etc." This pattern can be used to identify AF, without dedicated atrial sensing.

FIG. 5 shows an example of a "short-long" pattern of the V-V intervals during an AF episode. The top trace **505** shows what a bipolar atrial electrogram sensed from the atrial lead would look like (if it were present) and the bottom trace **510** is a bipolar ventricular electrogram sensed from a ventricular lead (e.g., sensed with bipolar electrodes **120A** and **120B** on lead **115** in FIG. 1, these electrodes are sometimes referred to as a Vrate channel). The x-axis shows the data sample indices (using a sampling rate of 200 Hz). The crosses on the ventricular electrogram mark the ventricular events detected in the Vrate channel.

In some examples, an interval is a long interval if it is longer than a specified interval threshold, and an interval is a short interval if it is less than a specified interval threshold. One threshold may be used to identify long and short threshold. In FIG. 5, the V-V intervals in the data segment were (in milliseconds): 250, 347.5, 260, 350, 262.5, 350, 260, 345, 255, 340, With a single threshold setting at, for example, 300 ms, the "short-long" pattern can be determined. In certain examples, a separate threshold is used to identify short thresholds and to identify long thresholds.

In some examples, a running average V-V interval is calculated. An interval is long if it exceeds the average V-V interval by a predetermined percentage, and an interval is short if it is less than the average V-V interval by a predetermined percentage. The short intervals mixed with long intervals is deemed to be sudden if a threshold number of mixed short and long intervals occur within a predetermined interval of time or within a specified number of V-V intervals.

At block **415**, the detected tachyarrhythmia is classified as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using a detected pattern of long and short V-V depolarization intervals. Using the example of FIG. 5, a captured repeated pattern of "short, long, short, long, . . ." may indicate AF. Thus, the detected tachyarrhythmia is classified according to a characteristic interval pattern recognized by the IMD. Other characteristic patterns may also be useful. At block **420**, the tachyarrhythmia classification is provided to a user or process.

Returning to FIG. 3, to implement the method **400** the signal analyzer module **310** measures V-V intervals. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module **315** detects an epi-

sode of tachyarrhythmia using the sensed depolarization signal using any of the methods described previously. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 detects a sudden presence of long and short V-V depolarization intervals and classifies the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia or ventricular tachyarrhythmia using a detected pattern of long and short V-V depolarization intervals. The specific pattern of long and short intervals may be a default pattern or may be programmed into the device by a clinician specifically for the subject. The tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 then provides the tachyarrhythmia classification to a user or process.

Once the detected tachyarrhythmia has been classified, in some examples the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 uses further analysis to confirm the tachyarrhythmia. In certain examples, the tachyarrhythmia is confirmed by a morphology analysis using a sensed far-field signal as described herein.

In some examples, once the tachyarrhythmia is classified, the IMD 300 gathers statistics about the tachyarrhythmia. In certain examples, the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module 315 initiates storage of a segment of the sensed depolarization signal and initiates storage of a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals. The signal segment and the histogram are communicated to a second device.

As set forth previously, lack of atrial sensing makes it difficult for a clinician to retrospectively diagnose atrial tachyarrhythmia such as AF and AT, yet this information is often important to a physician or clinician. The several examples described herein provide for an IMD to automatically diagnose atrial tachyarrhythmia even though dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit is absent in the device.

These computer-readable media can include, but are not limited to, hard disks, removable magnetic disks, removable optical disks (e.g., compact disks and digital video disks), magnetic cassettes, memory cards or sticks, random access memories (RAM's), read only memories (ROM's), and the like.

What is claimed is:

1. An apparatus comprising:

an implantable cardiac signal sensing circuit, configured to provide a sensed depolarization signal from a ventricle; and

a processor communicatively coupled to the cardiac signal sensing circuit, the processor including:

a signal analyzer module configured to:

determine a measure of stability of ventricular (v-V) depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal; and

determine a rate of change of the measure of stability of V-V depolarization intervals; and

a tachyarrhythmia discrimination module configured to: detect an episode of tachyarrhythmia using the depolarization signal;

determine whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is indicative of atrial tachyarrhythmia in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing using the determined rate of change of the measure of stability of V-V depolarization intervals; and

provide the determination to a user or process.

2. The apparatus of claim 1, wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability exceeds an atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

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3. The apparatus of claim 1, wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to classify the detected tachyarrhythmia as ventricular tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability is greater than a ventricular tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection thresh- 5
old and is less than the atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold.

4. The apparatus of claim 1,

wherein the signal analyzer module is configured to determine a rate of change of the measure of stability 10
when a ventricular depolarization rate or interval satisfies a specified threshold rate or threshold interval value; and

wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to: 15

classify the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies the specified threshold value; and

classify the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the measure of stability otherwise. 20

5. The apparatus of claim 1, including:

a memory communicatively coupled to the processor and configured to store a signal morphology template;

a far-field sensing channel configured to provide a far-field atrial and ventricular signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium or ventricle, and 25

wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to:

upon determining the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate sensing of the far-field signal; 30

initiate a comparison of a morphology of the sensed far-field signal to a stored morphology template by the signal analyzer module; and 35

confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

6. The apparatus of claim 5, wherein the signal analyzer module is configured to:

calculate a measure of similarity between a segment of the far-field signal and the morphology template, wherein the stored morphology template is representative of normal sinus rhythm; 40

calculate a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity, and 45

wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to confirm the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold and the variance of the measure of similarity is within a variance range. 50

7. The apparatus of claim 5, wherein the stored morphology template is associated with atrial tachyarrhythmia.

8. The apparatus of claim 1, including:

a memory communicatively coupled to the processor; and 55
a communication circuit, communicatively coupled to the processor, configured to communicate information wirelessly with a second separate device, and

wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to: 60

upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate storage of a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected tachyarrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold;

initiate storage of a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals; and 65

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communicate the stored segment and histogram to a second device.

9. The apparatus of claim 1, including:

a far-field sensing channel configured to provide a far-field atrial signal using an electrode location that is outside of an atrium;

a memory communicatively coupled to the processor; and
a communication circuit, communicatively coupled to the processor, configured to communicate information wirelessly with a second separate device, and

wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to:

upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, initiate storage of a segment of the sensed far-field signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold;

communicate the stored segment to the second device for comparison of a far-field signal morphology to a morphology template; and

receive an indication whether the detected tachyarrhythmia is atrial tachyarrhythmia from the second device.

10. The apparatus of claim 1, wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to:

detect an episode of atrial fibrillation (AF) using the depolarization signal;

determine a duration that the subject spends in AF; and
calculate a value of AF burden using the duration that the subject spends in AF.

11. The apparatus of claim 10, wherein the tachyarrhythmia discrimination module is configured to generate AF histogram data and communicate the histogram data to a separate device.

12. A method comprising:

detecting an episode of tachyarrhythmia from a depolarization signal sensed from a ventricle using a dedicated implantable ventricular sensing circuit and in an absence of a dedicated atrial chamber sensing circuit; determining a measure of stability of V-V depolarization intervals using the depolarization signal; 40

determining a rate of change of the measure of stability; classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia to discriminate between atrial tachyarrhythmia and ventricular tachyarrhythmia using the determined rate of change of the measure of stability of V-V depolarization intervals; and 45

providing the tachyarrhythmia classification to a user or process.

13. The method of claim 12, wherein classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia includes classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability exceeds an atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold. 50

14. The method of claim 13, wherein classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia includes classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as ventricular tachyarrhythmia when the rate of change of the measure of stability is greater than a ventricular tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold and is less than the atrial tachyarrhythmia rate of change detection threshold. 60

15. The method of claim 12,

wherein determining a rate of change of the measure of stability includes determining a rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies a threshold rate or interval value; and wherein classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia includes: 65

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classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the rate of change of the measure of stability when the ventricular rate or interval satisfies the threshold rate or interval value; and
 classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia according to the measure of stability otherwise.

16. The method of claim **12**, including:

upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, sensing a second signal using a far-field sensing channel; and

comparing a morphology of the second sensed signal to a morphology template, and

wherein classifying the tachyarrhythmia includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison.

17. The method of claim **16**, wherein classifying the tachyarrhythmia includes

calculating a measure of similarity between a segment of the second signal and the morphology template, wherein the morphology template is representative of normal sinus rhythm;

calculating a central tendency of the measure of similarity and a variance of the measure of similarity, and

wherein confirming the classification includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia when the central tendency of the measure of similarity is above a central tendency threshold and the variance of the measure of similarity is within a variance range.

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18. The method of claim **16**, including:

upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, storing a segment of the second signal when a duration of the detected arrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold,

wherein comparing a morphology includes communicating the stored segment from a first implantable medical device to a second device and comparing the morphology of the second sensed signal to the morphology template using the second device, and

wherein confirming the classification includes confirming the classification as atrial tachyarrhythmia using the morphology comparison by the second device.

19. The method of claim **16**, wherein comparing a morphology of the second signal includes comparing a morphology of the second sensed signal to a morphology template associated with atrial tachyarrhythmia.

20. The method of claim **12**, including

upon classifying the detected tachyarrhythmia as atrial tachyarrhythmia, storing a segment of the depolarization signal when a duration of the detected tachyarrhythmia exceeds a duration threshold;

storing a histogram of V-V depolarization intervals, wherein the histogram indicates regular and irregular V-V depolarization intervals; and

communicating the stored segment and histogram from an implantable medical device to a second device.

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摘要(译)

一种装置包括可植入心脏信号感测电路, 其被配置为从心室和处理器提供感测的去极化信号。处理器包括信号分析器模块和快速心律失常鉴别模块。信号分析器模块被配置为使用去极化信号确定心室 (V-V) 去极化间隔的稳定性的度量, 并确定稳定性度量的变化率。快速性心律失常判别模块被配置为使用去极化信号检测快速性心律失常发作, 使用所确定的变化率确定检测到的快速性心律失常是否指示房性快速性心律失常, 并向用户或过程提供确定。
